

Pigot 1823-24

Coggeshall Is market town, distant about 47 miles north-east of London, by the road passing through Braintree and about 44 by the road through Witham. It stands partly upon the low ground on the north side of the River Blackwater, and partly upon the slope of an agreeable hill, which rises upon the same, side. It is indebted for its existence, according to Morant, to an abbey founded here; other antiquaries ascribe its origin to the Romans, and Mr. Drake, who supports the latter opinion, contends, strenuously that this place is the CANONIUM of Antonius, an opinion which he supports by observing, that its distance exactly answers to the numbers of the itinerary, by which CANONIUM is placed between CAMALODUNUM, and CESAROMAGUS, which last he conjectures to be Dunmow, through which a Roman military way proceeds to Colchester, which we have strong reasons for believing to be the CAMALODUNUM so much spoken of in the history of the Roman Conquests, and possessions in Britain. Mr. Drake further endeavours to strengthen his opinion by mentioning several coins, & other Roman antiquities, found in the neighbourhood. The evidence of these antiquities, though inadequate to the establishment of Mr. Drake's conjecture, is nevertheless sufficient to prove the place to have been a Roman villa.

This manor was, in the reign of Edward the Confessor the property of Cole, a Saxon; but we find it at the period of Doomsday survey, in the possession, Eustace, Earl of Boulogne, from whose family it passed to the crown, in consequence of the marriage a Maud, heiress of the above-mentioned Earl, with Stephen, Earl of Blois, and afterwards King of England. This monarch conjointly with his wife, here founded an abbey, for Cisterian monks, close to the river, and consecrating it to the Virgin Mary, endowed it with this and various other manors. The abbey thus founded, and endowed, received various additional grants from succeeding sovereigns, especially one of a hogshead of red wine, to be annually delivered in London, at Easter, by the King's gentleman of the wine cellar. Its revenues, at the dissolution, were estimated at £290 8s. per annum. The manor was the granted to Sir Thomas Seymour, brother to Edward, Duke of Somerset, in the year 1538, but little of the abbey now exists; not far from its ruins stand the remains of a bridge, of three arches, built originally by King Stephen. This town was formerly noted for its woollen and clothing trade, and particularly for a superior kind of baize, distinguished by the name of Coggeshall Whites. The trade is now nearly extinct, but of late years several silk manufactories have added much to the trade of the town. Excepting the church, which possesses nothing particularly deserving attention, this town has no remarkable buildings. Market day, Thursday. Fairs on Whit-Tuesday.

Population in 1821, 2,896 persons, viz 1,391 males and 1,505 females. POST OFFICE, at the Chapel Inn. Samuel Sprague, Post Master. The letter box closes at half-past six in winter, and half-past seven in summer, and the letters are dispatched half an hour after.

Pigot 1832-34

COGGESHALL (or GREAT COGGESHALL) is a market town and parish, in the hundred of Lexden; about 47 miles N. E. of London by the road through Braintree, and 44 through Witham, 18 from Chelmsford, and 13 from Nayland in Suffolk. It stands partly upon the low ground on the north side of the river Blackwater, and partly upon the slope of an agreeable hill, which rises upon the same side. It is indebted for its existence, according to Morant, to an abbey founded here; other antiquaries ascribe its origin to the Romans, and contend that this place is the Canonium of Antonins, in support of which assertion is cited the fact of several coins, and other Roman antiquities, found in the neighbourhood: the evidence of these reliques, though inadequate to satisfy the learned disputants as to the exact original designation of this place, is nevertheless sufficient to prove it to have been a Roman villa. This manor was, in the reign of Edward the Confessor, the property of Cole, a Saxon; and it subsequently passed to King Stephen, who founded an abbey here for Cistercian monks. Not far from its ruins are the remains of a bridge of three arches, erected by the same monarch. This town was formerly noted for its woollen and clothing trade, and particularly for a superior kind of baize, distinguished by the name of 'Coggeshall white' this trade is now nearly extinct; but the manufacturing of silk has been carried on of late years to a very considerable extent, and employs at present a great number of hands. There are some good Inns here, amongst which may be particularized the 'White Hart' and 'Chapel' Inns, two exceedingly well conducted houses. Peter Da Cane, Esq, of Braxted Lodge, is lord of the manor, and holds a court baron annually on Whit Monday. The places of worship are, the parish church, dedicated to St. Peter; and a chapel each for independents, baptists, Wesleyan methodists and quakers. The living of Great Coggeshall is a vicarage, in the gift of the lord of the manor; the Rev EW Matthew is the present incumbent. The poor of the parish are benefited by several munificent bequests, derived from estates, some of which are in Suffolk, and produce upwards of £360. a year; besides others of minor importance. A philosophical society was established here about four years since, by several highly talented individuals; it continues to be well supported; the lecture meetings are monthly. Many beautiful seats ornament this neighbourhood, and the country is highly cultivated; but the views, from its flatness, and the absence of wood, are not of the first order of beauty. The market, a large one for corn, is held on Thursday; and there is an annual fair on Whit-Tuesday, for cattle and toys. The parish of Great Coggeshall contained, by the census for 1831, 3,227 inhabitants; having increased its population 758 since the year 1801.

POST OFFICE, COGGESHALL, Samuel Sprague, Post Master. Letters arrive every morning in summer at eight, and in winter at half-past eight; and are despatched every morning in summer at eight, and in winter at half-past seven.

COGGESHALL, or GREAT COGGESHALL, is a market town and parish in the Witham division of the hundred of Lexden-about 47 miles N. E. of London, by the road through Braintree and 44 through Witham, 18 N. E. of a Chelmsford, and 13 s. w. of Nayland, Suffolk. It stands partly upon the low ground on the north side of the Blackwater, and partly upon the slope of an agreeable hill which rises upon the same side. Morant asserts that the town owes its existence to an abbey founded at Little Coggeshall; but other antiquaries ascribe its origin to the Romans, and contend that it is the Canonium of Antonius: the fact of Roman coins and other relics of that nation having been found in the neighbourhood is adduced in support of the latter opinion; and though these antiques cannot determine the designation of the place, yet they confirm the supposition of its having been a Roman station. Cole, a Saxon, was proprietor of the manor in the reign of Edward the Confessor; and it subsequently devolved to King Stephen, who founded an abbey here for Cistercian monks. The remains of a bridge of three arches, erected by the same monarch, are still to be seen at a short distance from the ruins of the abbey. Great Coggeshall is in the dutchy of Lancaster; the coroner is appointed by letters patent, and is entitled to exclusive jurisdiction, the dutchy extends to, and includes, in the county of Essex, Great and Little Coggeshall, Braintree, Bocking and about two hundred other places. Great Coggeshall had in former ages a guild, called 'the fullers' and drapers' guild; the guild-hall stood on what is termed the Market-hill. The woollen and clothing trade, and particularly the production of a superior type of baize, designated Coggeshall whites, formerly gave celebrity to this town: these branches are not now tended to; they have been superseded by the manufacture of silk, which for many years has been carried on to a considerable extent, and at present employs numerous hands.

Amongst several good inns, the White Hart' is distinguished as an excellent commercial house. The lord of the manor, Peter Du Cane, Esq of Bradwell Lodge, holds a court baron annually on Whit-Monday.

Coggeshall formerly comprised the parishes of Great and Little Coggeshall, now consolidated-the latter at this time only a hamlet to the former. The church, dedicated to St. Peter, is a spacious handsome structure, with a large square tower; the benefice is a vicarage, in the patronage of the lord of the manor in the incumbency of the Rev. Henry Eley, M A There is a chapel each for independents, Baptists, Wesleyan methodists and the society of friends. Several munificent bequests benefit the poor of the parish; they are derived from estates, the principal of which are in Suffolk, and produce upwards of £360. a year; and there are other minor charities. Some years since a philosophical society was established here, by several individuals of society superior talent; it continues to maintain a high character, and the monthly lecture meetings are respectably attended. This neighbourhood is embellished by many elegant seats; the country is highly cultivated, but from its flatness, and the absence of wood, the views are not of the most attractive order. The market, abundantly supplied with corn, &c. is held on Thursday; and there is an annual fair, for cattle and toys, on Whit-Tuesday. The parish of Great Coggeshall contained, in 1831, 3,227 inhabitants; at that census LITTLE COGGESHALL was returned as a separate parish, with a population of 455.

POST OFFICE, Samuel Sprague, Post Master. - Letters from all parts arrive every morning at seven in summer and at eight in winter, and are dispatched every morning at nine.

COGGESHALL, on the river Blackwater, is distant from Witham 7 miles, from London 44, from Braintree 6 miles, and 3 miles from the Kelvedon station on the E. C. Rail. It is in the Witham Union, and consists of two parishes—Great Coggeshall with 2,770 acres and a population of 3,408, and bordering the river whence it rises, and occupies the acclivity of a hill from which it derived its ancient name, Sunnedon or Sunny Bank. It is noted for the excellent quality of its land and numerous powerful springs of pure water, many houses being supplied therewith by iron pipes, and for centuries past the inhabitants have been famous for the growth of garden seeds. There are many good buildings, an extensive silk manufactory, and another of equal importance for the manufacture of the French patent silk plush for hats, being the only one in England, and which is equally beneficial to the town. There are also several velvet weaving establishments introduced, and a great many young females are employed in the tambour lace trade, which, with the remains of its ancient clothing trade, give it the appearance of business and animation. It was formerly celebrated for the manufacture of Coggeshall whites, a kind of baize of superior fineness. The church is dedicated to St. Peter, and is a fine building in the perpendicular style. There are meeting houses for Independents, Baptists, Quakers and Methodists. There are three alms houses, and in 1833 schooling for 573 scholars, 294 daily, 189 infant, 190 sundry. The living is a vicarage, value £250 per annum. The town, which is very ancient, was undoubtedly the seat of a Roman establishment, and many remains of antiquity have been found here. It is on a Roman road. The market which is held on Thursday was granted by Henry the Third, as also the right of holding a fair on Whit Monday. Here are gas works.

LITTLE COGGESHALL is on the southern side of the river Blackwater; with the town it communicates by three bridges. King Stephen and Queen Maud in 1142 founded here a Cistercian Abbey, dedicated to the Virgin Mary, which at the dissolution was valued at £298 8s per annum. The remains of this abbey near the river are worth inspection. All the lands which belonged to this monastery at the time of its dissolution continue to be free from tithes both great and small, whilst in the hands of the proprietors, and many are tithe free by purchase. The church of the monastery is entirely demolished; it stood in the park, a field near the river. The other church of Little Coggeshall dedicated to St. Nicholas, forms part of a barn near the site of the abbey. Little Coggeshall with 830 acres & a population of 443.

Total population, in 1841, 3,851. The assessment of Great Coggeshall was, in 1843, £8,495 5s. to the poor rates, and to the Property Tax £9,485 7s. 6d.; Little Coggeshall, to Property Tax, £2,625 9s 1d. The town is partly on low ground

COGGESHALL, a small ancient town, is pleasantly situated on the north side of the river Blackwater, and on the Colchester and Braintree road, 9 miles W. by S. of Colchester, 5 miles E. of Braintree, and 3 miles N. by W. of Kelvedon. It has a fair for pedlery, &c., on Whit-Tuesday, but its market, formerly held on Thursday, is now disused. It was one of the earliest seats of the woollen manufacture in this county, and was celebrated for a kind of bays, or baize, of superior fineness, called "Coggeshall Whites," in making which many persons acquired large fortunes, and one of them, Mr Thomas Guyon, died here in 1664, worth nearly £100,000.

This trade declined many years ago, as noticed at page 69, and was succeeded by the silk manufacture, which still gives employment to many of the inhabitants, though it is now in a depressed state; and a large mill, built about ten years ago, for the manufacture of French patent silk plush, for hats, is now closed. Here are several silk velvet weaving establishments, and a large silk throwing mill; and many females in the town are employed in the tambour lace trade.

The parish of GREAT COGGESHALL contains 2596A. IR. 35P. of land, besides about 40A. of roads, &c.; and had 2469 inhabitants, in 1831, and 3408 in 1841. With it is ecclesiastically consolidated the parish of LITTLE COGGESHALL, in Witham Hundred, on the opposite side of the river. The latter was celebrated for its abbey, and had two churches, but has only 443 souls, and 1002A. of land.

Morant affirms that the town owes its existence to the abbey, which, after its foundation, "drew round it a number of inhabitants and dependants;" but some other antiquaries, and particularly Mr. Drake, suppose it to have been of Roman origin; indeed, that gentleman argues strongly in favour of its being the Canonium of Antoninus, which others have placed at Writtle, and some at Chelmsford. (See page 367) Drake endeavours to corroborate his opinion that Coggeshall is the site of the station Canonium, by mentioning some Roman coins and other antiquities found in the vicinity. In an arched brick vault, near the town, was found a phial with a lamp in it, covered with a Roman tile, 14 inches in diameter; and also some urns, with ashes and bones, and two sacrificing dishes of polished red earth, having at the bottom of one of them, in fair Roman letters, the inscription "Cocclii M." At Westfield, which belonged to the abbey, was found a large brazen pot, and the ploughman who found it sent for the abbot to examine it. The mouth of the pot was closed with a white substance, as hard as burnt brick; when that was removed, there was found another pot, of earth; and within it, a lesser pot, of earth, covered with a velvet-like substance, fastened with a silk lace; and within this were found whole bones, and many pieces of small bones, wrapped up in fine silk, of fresh colour. These remains, though insufficient to prove that Coggeshall was a Roman station, are admitted as evidence that it was a Roman villa.

In Edward the Confessor's reign, the lordship of Great and Little Coggeshall was held by Colo, a Saxon; and at the Domesday survey, it was held by Eustace, Earl of Boulogne, whose heiress, Maud, conveyed it to the crown by her marriage with Stephen, Earl of Blois, afterwards king. In 1142, Stephen and his queen founded an ABBEY here, near the river, in Little Coggeshall, for Cistercian monks, and having dedicated it to the Virgin Mary, endowed it with this and other manors. In 1203, King John granted the abbot and monks permission to enclose and impark their wood at Coggeshall; and in 1247, they obtained liberty of free warren from Henry III., who also invested them with the privileges of holding a weekly market, and an eight days' annual fair. In the reign of Edward III., the monks founded a chantry in their church, to pray daily for the king, the queen, and their issue; in consideration of which, the king, in 1344, granted them a hogshead of red wine, to be delivered every Easter, out of the royal cellar. A second chantry was founded here, in 1407, by Joan de Bohun, Countess of Hereford, and others, who bestowed some valuable estates upon the monks for its support. On the surrender of the abbey, in 1538, its annual revenues were valued at £298. 8s.

In the same year, the site of the abbey, and the manor of Coggeshall and other estates, were granted to Sir Thos. Seymour, but in 1541, he exchanged them with the king for other possessions. Queen Mary, in the first year of her reign, granted the manors of Great and Little Coggeshall, Home Grange, a water mill, and the fishery of the river, to the wife of Thos. Laventhorpe, for life. Afterwards they passed, with Monk-wood and Little-wood, to Sir Henry Bromley. In 1604, they were held by Cyprian Warner and others, and afterwards by the Mayhews and Lydes. The heiress of N. Lyde, Esq., (who also bought the dairy farms of Cardhall and Capons,) conveyed these manors and estates, in marriage, to Richard du Cane, Esq., whose posterity have held them to the present time. Capt. Charles Du Cane, of Boxted, is the present lord of the manors of both parishes, but a great part of the soil belongs to J. Bullock, O. Hanbury, R. M. White, F. U. Pattisson, T. Batt, T. Sadler, C. J. Skingley, J. Hall, and J. Mayhew, Esqs., and several lesser owners, some of whom have neat mansions

here.

All that remains of the abbey is part of the church, now thatched and converted into a barn. It is in the form of a nave, chancel, and porch, and the east window is in three lights, apparently about the age of Henry III. The walls are chiefly of flint, with brick dressings. In the vicinity is a bridge of three arches, originally built by King Stephen, over a channel that was cut to convey the water of the river nearer to the abbey.

OLDFIELD GRANGE, a handsome seat, about a mile N.W. of the town, is the property and residence of Osgood Hanbury, Esq., and gives name to a manor which has a pound for waifs and strays. Highfield is the seat of R. M. White, Esq.; and Leeze House is the residence of Mrs. Skingley. Bouchier's, vulgarly called Bowser's Grange, is a farm which anciently belonged to the Bouchier family, and was afterwards held by the Smiths and Gurdons. Under the names of Coggeshall Magna-cum-Membris, and Coggeshall Parva, the two parishes form part of the Liberty of the Duchy of Lancaster. John Mayhew, Esq., is deputy coroner for those parts of this extensive liberty which are in this county. Some part of Little Coggeshall was given to Canterbury Cathedral, before the Conquest, by Earl Godwin, and that parish has since been considered a peculiar, in the spiritual jurisdiction of the Archbishop, under his commissary, the dean of Bocking, at whose court a sidesman is chosen every year, who pays 6s. 8d. as an acknowledgment. Mr. John Mayhew is secretary, and Mr. Jph. Denney, manager of the Gas Works. The town is partly on low ground, bordering on the river, but mostly on the acclivity, whence it was anciently called Sunnedon, or Sunny bank.

Great Coggeshall CHURCH (St. Peter,) stands pleasantly in the highest part of the town, and is a large stone fabric, in the decorated style, with a square tower and six bells. It has a lofty nave and side aisles, separated by elegant light clustered pillars, supporting pointed arches. It is neatly pewed, and has a good organ, purchased by subscription, in 1819. It had formerly two endowed chantries and twelve obits, and on the walls are several neat monuments. One of the latter is in memory of the Hon. Robert Townsend, who served in the seven campaigns of the Duke of Marlborough. The living is a vicarage, valued in K.B. at £11. 3s. 4d., and in 1831 at £230, and now enjoyed by the Rev. W. J. Dampier, M.A., who has a good residence, and 16 acres of glebe. Capt. Charles Du Cane is the patron, and the great tithes belong to him and several other impropiators, among whom are T. B. Western, Esq., and C. J. Skingley, now a minor. The tithes are about to be commuted, and they belonged to the abbey till 1223, when the Bishop of London appointed a vicar, and obliged the monks to give up for his maintenance part of the small tithes, and 20A. of glebe. The inhabitants of Little Coggeshall dispute their liability to pay vicarial tithes, or to contribute towards the reparation of the church, though they have been accommodated here with sittings, &c., since their own two churches went to decay, viz., the Abbey Church and St. Nicholas's, the latter of which was built by the parishioners. Tradition says, the bells of the abbey church were sent to Kelvedon. The Baptists, Independents, Wesleyans, and the Society of Friends, have chapels in the town; and here is a National and also a British School, the former built about 1840, and having dwellings for the master and mistress, and separate rooms for boys, girls, and infants. Here are also various Charities for the poor, and an endowed Free School, as noticed below.

The Coggeshall Literary and Mechanics' Institution, was established in 1847, under the presidency of W P Honeywood, Esq., and it already numbers about 130 members. Its lecture and reading rooms are in Church street. The Coggeshall and United Parishes Agricultural Society holds its meetings here, and is liberally supported by the gentlemen and farmers of the town and neighbourhood. The Rev John Owen, DD, a learned and voluminous writer, was born here in 1616, and became a favourite preacher to Cromwell, who made him vice-chancellor. He and his father held the vicarage here, as also did James Boys, who was remarkable for the "infinite number of sermons of his own composition which he left behind him," and for his Exposition of the Thirty nine Articles.

In 1580 Thos. Paycock left £200 to be laid out in lands, and the yearly proceeds to be divided among the poor of Great and Little Coggeshall, in wood, and white and red herrings. The property purchased with this legacy is now let for £58 a year, and consists of 6A. of garden ground, a pasture of 5A., and two fields containing 12A., all in the parish of Halstead. Pursuant to a decree of Commissioners of Charitable Uses, in 1613, only £3 of the yearly income is distributed among the poor of Little Coggeshall, and the rest among the poor of Great Coggeshall, under the name of wood money. In 1588 an ancient chapel then used for the corn market, and a small garden adjoining, were conveyed to 18 trustees, for the use and benefit of the Companies of Fullers and Weavers, until the purchase money advanced by them was repaid; and afterwards for the benefit of the poor. This old Market House was pulled down in 1787, and the site of it and the garden now forms part of the Market hill, and yields about 20s. a-year, in stallages, paid at the fair. Belonging to the same trust are two cottages in Back lane, let for £2. 10s., and the Clock Tower. The latter stands on land belonging to Crane's Charity, and the two cottages

were built with £50 belonging to the poor, among whom the rent is divided, with Paycock's and other charities. Four Almshouses adjoining the above-named cottages, were built with charity money, on land given by Joseph Greenwood, in 1795. The inmates are appointed by the overseers and churchwardens. In 1601, JOHAN SMITH left £400 to be invested in the purchase of an annuity to be applied in weekly distributions of bread among the poor of Coggeshall and Bocking. In respect of this charity the two parishes have, in equal shares, a yearly rent charge of £15 out of the rectory of East Tilbury. In 1616 Jane Gooday left for the poor of Great Coggeshall £30, which in 1718, was vested in a yearly rent charge of 32s. out of a house in East Street. This annuity is applied in needful clothing for the aged poor. In 1604 Thomas Guyon left £200 for the most honest aged poor, and it was invested in a yearly rent charge of £10. 8s. out of Windmill Fields. This is distributed in weekly doles of bread, together with a yearly rent charge of £13, left by Sir Mark Guyon, in 1678, out of Highfield Farm, now belonging to Richard. M. White, Esq. In 1669 SAMUEL CRANE, left for the benefit of the poor, his house in Stoneham Street, now in four compartments, two of which are let for £4. 10s.; a third is the Clock Tower, already noticed; and the fourth is a large upper room, in which Hitcham's Charity School is kept. The £4. 10s. is distributed with the wood money, as also is £9. 4s. per annum, derived from the rents of three tenements in Church Street, left by Anthony Hibben. The poor of Little Coggeshall have £8 a year out of Roman's Farm, at East Haningfield, left by Ann Richardson.

HITCHAM'S CHARITY SCHOOL, &c. The property belonging to this charity is vested with the Master and Fellows of Pembroke Hall, Cambridge, and consequently the late Charity Commissioners did not enquire into it. Sir Robert Hitcham, Kt, of Ipswich, by will, in 1636, settled the castle and manors of Framlingham and Saxtead, in Suffolk, on the Master and Fellows of Pembroke Hall, in trust for the erection of a workhouse at Framlingham, "to set the poor of that parish, and those of Debenham and Coggeshall, to work; and for the foundation of Almshouses and Schools at the same place, for the said poor, as well as for apprenticing poor children. For many years poor children and almspeople were sent from Coggeshall to Framlingham, but the distance rendering this expensive and inconvenient, law suits arose among the parties concerned; and it was appointed by the parliament of Oliver Cromwell, in 1658, that the College should pay to the town of Coggeshall £150 per annum; which sum should be paid to 12 trustees, in half-yearly moieties; and be employed by them in the support of a workhouse and a school; and in binding out apprentices, and in sending some of the grammar scholars to Pembroke Hall College, Cambridge. The schoolmaster is appointed by the Master and Fellows of the said College, and they now allow him a yearly salary of £80, for which he is required to teach grammar, reading, and writing to 30 free scholars, appointed by the trustees.

COGGESHALL, on the river Blackwater, is distant from Witham 7 miles north-east, from London 44, from Colchester 10 miles west, from Halstead 9 miles south, from Braintree 6 miles east, and 3 miles from the Kelvedon station. It is in the Lexden Hundred, and in the Witham Union, and consists of two parishes-Great Coggeshall, with 2,770 acres and a population of 3,403, and Little Coggeshall, with 836 acres and a population of 443: total population, in 1841, 3,851, and now at least 4,000.

The assessment of Great Coggeshall was, in 1843, £3.495 5s to the poor rates, and to the Property Tax £9,485 7s. 6d.; Little Coggeshall, to Property Tax, £2.625 9s. 1d.

The town is partly on low ground bordering the river whence it rises, and occupies the acclivity of a hill, from which it derived its ancient name, Sunnedon. It is noted for the excellent quality of its land, and numerous powerful springs of pure water, many houses being supplied there-with by iron pipes, and for centuries past the inhabitants have been famous for the growth of garden seeds. There are many good buildings, amongst which is an extensive range, where a new trade is carried on in the refining and manufacture of the patent isinglass and gelatine, affording employment to a number of persons; an extensive silk manufactory, and another for the manufacture of the French patent silk plush for hats, which has recently been carried on with much spirit by a company formed of the principal townsmen, and under the superintendence of the patentee, being the only one in England. There are also several velvet weaving establishments introduced, and a great many young females are employed in the tambour lace trade, which, with the remains of its ancient clothing trade, give it the appearance of business and animation. There are breweries, maltings and an iron foundry. There is a bank.

It was formerly celebrated for the manufacture of Coggeshall whites, a kind of baize of superior fineness. The church is dedicated to St. Peter, and is a fine building in the perpendicular style; the chancel end has recently been repaired, and an open timber roof added. The living is a vicarage, value £250, and 16 acres of glebe, in the patronage of Capt Charles Ducane, and incumbency of Rev William James Dampier, MA.

There are meeting houses for Independents, Baptists, Quakers and Methodists. There are 3 almshouses, National, British and Free schools, and, in 1833, schooling for 573 scholars, 294 daily, 189 infant, 190 sundry. The town, which is very ancient, was the seat of a Roman establishment, and many remains of antiquity have been found here. Holdfield Grange, 11/2 miles north-west, is a handsome red brick mansion, with spacious conservatory, and grounds well stocked with game, the seat of Osgood Hanbury, Esq.

It is on a Roman road. The market, which is held on Thursday, was granted by Henry III, as also the right of holding a fair on Whit Monday. Here are gas works.

LITTLE COGGESHALL is on the southern side of the river Blackwater; with the town it communicates by three bridges. King Stephen and Queen Maud, in 1142, founded here a Cistercian abbey, dedicated to the Virgin Mary, which at the dissolution was valued at £298 83. per annum. The remains of this abbey near the river are worth inspection. All the lands which belonged to this monastery at the time of its dissolution continue to be free from tithes both great and small, whilst in the hands of the proprietors, and many are tithe free by purchase. The church of the monastery is entirely demolished: it stood in the Park, a field near the river. The other church of Little Coggeshall, dedicated to St. Nicholas, forms part of a barn near the site of the abbey.

COGGESHALL, on the river Blackwater, is distant from Kelvedon station 2 miles, from Witham 7 north-east, from London 44, from Colchester 9 west, from Halstead 8 south, and from Braintree 6 east. It is in Lexden hundred, and Witham union, North Essex, Coggeshall rural deanery, Lexden deanery, Colchester archdeaconry, and Rochester bishopric, and consists of two parishes-Great Coggeshall, with 2,770 acres, and a population of 3,580, and Little Coggeshall, with 830 acres, and a population of 430; total, in 1851, 4,010 people. The town is partly on low ground bordering the river whence it rises, and occupies the acclivity of a hill, from which it may have derived its ancient name, Sunnedon. It is noted for the excellent quality of its land, and numerous powerful springs of pure water, many houses being supplied therewith by iron pipes; and for centuries past the inhabitants have been famous for the growth of garden seeds. There are many good buildings, amongst which is an extensive range, where a new trade is carried on in the refining and manufacture of the patent isinglass and gelatine, affording employment to a number of persons, and a great many young females are employed in the tambour lace trade, which give the town the appearance of business and animation. Here are also extensive silk manufactories, the principal one belonging to Hall and Son, for the throwing of silk, which establishment finds employment for nearly 700 hands. There are breweries, maltings, and an iron foundry. There are two banks. It was formerly celebrated for the manufacture of "Coggeshall whites," a kind of baize of superior fineness.

The church of St Peter is a fine building, in the Perpendicular style, with tower containing 5 bells; the chancel end was repaired in 1847, and the whole of the nave and aisles were thoroughly restored in 1854. The font is worthy of notice. The living is a vicarage, value £250, with residence and 20 acres of glebe, in the patronage of Charles Ducane, Esq, and held by the Rev. William James Dampier, M.A.; the Rev. William Francis Fraser, B.A., is curate; T. B. Weston, Esq, and Henry and G D Skingley, are the lay impropiators tithes commuted at £417 3s. per annum. There are meeting-houses for Independents, Baptists, Quakers, and Methodists. There are three almshouses, National school, with 100 children, and an infant school, with 90 children, in connection with it; also a school in connection with the Dissenters, and a Sunday school connected with it. There is Sir Robert Hitcham's charity for the education of 30 boys. A handsome building in the Elizabethan style is now in the course of erection in West-street, intended for the school, including residence for master, the estimated cost of which will be about £1,000. The endowment is considerable. The Trustees are the Master and Fellows of Pembroke College, Cambridge. Osgood Hanbury, Esq., treasurer; R Stevens, Esq, secretary; and Mr. T. J. Hyde, master. Here is also a Mechanics' Institute.

The town, which is very ancient, was the seat of a Roman establishment, and many remains of antiquity have been found here. Holdfield Grange, 1 miles north-west, is a handsome red brick mansion, with spacious conservatory, and grounds well stocked with game, the seat of Osgood Hanbury, Esq. It is on a Roman road. The market, which is held on Thursday, was granted by Henry III., as also the right of holding a fair on Whit Monday. Here are gas-works, and a literary institution and reading-rooms, and there are numerous charities.

The land is undulating, soil light, subsoil gravel, with several small streams running through it. Charles Ducane, of Great Coggeshall, is lord of the manor, who, with Osgood Hanbury, Esq, T B Weston, Esq, and Jonathan Bullock, Esq, are the chief landowners.

LITTLE COGGESHALL is on the southern side of the river Blackwater; with the town it communicates by three bridges. King Stephen and Queen Maud, in 1142, founded here a Cistercian abbey, dedicated to the Virgin Mary, which at the Dissolution was valued at £293 8s. per annum. The remains of this abbey near the river are worth inspection. All the lands which belonged to this monastery at the time of its dissolution continue to be free from tithes both great and small whilst in the hands of the proprietors. The church of the monastery is entirely demolished; it stood in the Park, a field near the river. The other church of Little Coggeshall, dedicated to St. Nicholas, is used as a barn near the site of the abbey.

White's 1863

COGGESHALL, a small ancient town, is pleasantly situated on the north side of the river Blackwater, and on the Colchester and Braintree road, 9½ miles W. by S. of Colchester, 5½ miles E. of Braintree, and 3 miles N. by W. of Kelvedon. It is partly on low ground, bordering on the river, but mostly on the acclivity, whence it was anciently called Sunnedon, or Sunny-bank. It has a fair for pedlery, &c., on Whit-Tuesday, but its market, formerly held on Thursday, is now disused. It was one of the earliest seats of the woollen manufacture in this county, and was celebrated for a kind of bays, or baize, of superior fineness, called "Coggeshall Whites," in making which many persons acquired large fortunes, and one of them, Mr. Thomas Guyon, died here in 1664, worth nearly £100,000. This trade declined many years ago, as noticed at page 72, and was succeeded by the silk manufacture, which still gives employment to many of the inhabitants. Here are several silk velvet weaving establishments, and a large silk throwing mill, employing 700 hands. Many females in the town are employed in the tambour lace trade. Here is also a large gelatine and isinglass manufactory, employing about 40 hands. The parish of Great Coggeshall contains 2596A. 1R. 35P. of land, and had 2469 inhabitants, in 1831; 3408 in 1841; and 3769 in 1861. With it is ecclesiastically consolidated the parish of Little Coggeshall, in Witham Hundred, on the opposite side of the river. The latter was celebrated for its abbey, and had two churches. It has only 429 souls, and 1002A. of land. Morant affirms that the town owes its existence to the abbey, which, after its foundation, "drew round it a number of inhabitants and dependants;" but some other antiquaries, particularly Mr. Drake, suppose it to have been of Roman origin; indeed, that gentleman argues strongly in favour of its being the Canonium of Antoninus, which others have placed at Writtle, and some at Chelmsford. Drake endeavours to corroborate his opinion that Coggeshall is the site of the Canonium, by mentioning some Roman coins and other antiquities found in the vicinity. In an arched brick vault, near the town, was found a phial with a lamp in it, covered with a Roman tile, 14 inches in diameter; and also some urns, with ashes and bones, and two sacrificing dishes of polished red earth, having at the bottom of one of them, in fair Roman letters, the inscription "Coccli M." At Westfield, which belonged to the abbey, was found a large brazen pot, and the ploughman who found it sent for the abbot to examine it. The mouth of the pot was closed with a white substance, as hard as burnt brick; when that was removed, there was found another pot, of earth; and within it, a lesser pot, of earth, covered with a velvet-like substance, fastened with a silk lace; and within this were found whole bones, and many pieces of small bones, wrapped up in fine silk, of fresh colour. These remains, though insufficient to prove that Coggeshall was a Roman station, are admitted as evidence that it was a Roman villa.

In Edward the Confessor's reign, the lordship of Great and Little Coggeshall was held by Colo, a Saxon; and at the Domesday survey, it was held by Eustace, Earl of Boulogne, whose heiress, Maud, conveyed it to the crown by her marriage with Stephen, Earl of Blois, afterwards king. In 1142, Stephen and his queen founded an Abbey here, near the river, in Little Coggeshall, for Cistercian monks, and having dedicated it to the Virgin Mary, endowed it with this and other manors. In 1203, King John granted to the abbot and monks permission to enclose and impark their wood at Coggeshall; and in 1247, they obtained liberty of free warren from Henry III., who also invested them with the privileges of holding a weekly market, and an eight days' annual fair. In the reign of Edward III., the monks founded a chantry in their church, to pray daily for the king, the queen, and their issue; in consideration of which, the king, in 1344, granted them a hogshead of red wine, to be delivered every Easter, out of the royal cellar. A second chantry was founded here, in 1407, by Joan de Bohun, Countess of Hereford, and others, who bestowed some valuable estates upon the monks for its support. On the surrender of the abbey, in 1538, its annual revenues were valued at £298. 8s. In the same year, the site of the abbey, and the manor of Coggeshall and other estates, were granted to Sir Thos. Seymour, but in 1541, he exchanged them with the king for other possessions. Queen Mary, in the first year of her reign, granted the manors of Great and Little Coggeshall, Home Grange, a water mill, and the fishery of the river, to the wife of Thos. Lavenhorpe, for life. Afterwards they passed, with Monk-wood and Little-wood, to Sir Henry Bromley. In 1604, they were held by Cyprian Warner and others, and afterwards by the Mayhews and Lydes. The heiress of N. Lyde, Esq., (who also bought the dairy farms of Cardhall and Capons,) conveyed these manors and estates, in marriage, to Richard Du Cane, Esq., whose posterity have held them to the present time. Chas. Du Cane, Esq., of Braxted Park, is the present lord of the manors of both parishes, but a great part of the soil belongs to the Rev. Walter T. Bullock, the Honeywood family, Osgood Hanbury, G. Skingley, T. B. Western, and F. U. Pattisson, Esqrs.; and several smaller free and copyholders. Some of

them have neat mansions here.

All that remains of the Abbey is part of the church, now thatched and converted into a barn. It is in the form of a nave, chancel, and porch, and the east window is in three lights, apparently about the age of Henry III. The walls are chiefly of flint, with brick dressings. In the vicinity is a bridge of three arches, originally built by King Stephen, over a channel that was cut to convey the water of the river nearer to the abbey. Oldfield Grange, a handsome seat, about a mile N.W. of the town, is the property and residence of Osgood Hanbury, Esq., and gives name to a manor. Bouchier's, vulgarly called Bowser's Grange, is a farm which anciently belonged to the Bouchier family, and was afterwards held by the Smiths and Gurdons. Under the names of Coggeshall Magna-cum-Membris, and Coggeshall Parva, the two parishes form part of the Liberty of the Duchy of Lancaster. Coggeshall Gas Works were commenced in 1843, and enlarged at subsequent periods. They have now cost about £4000, raised in £5 shares. Mr. Wm. Doubleday is secretary to the Gas Co.; and Mr. Thos. Willett, manager of the works.

Great Coggeshall Church (St. Peter) stands pleasantly in the highest part of the town, and is a large stone fabric, in the perpendicular style, with a square tower and five bells. It has a lofty nave and side aisles, separated by elegant light clustered pillars, supporting pointed arches. It is neatly pewed, and has a good organ. During the last ten years about £5000 has been expended in repairing it, though it is more than 20 years since a church rate was levied. It had formerly two endowed chantries and twelve obits, and on the walls are several neat monuments. One of the latter is in memory of the Hon. Robert Townsend, who served in the seven campaigns of the Duke of Marlborough. The living is a vicarage, valued in K.B. at £11. 3s. 4d., and in 1831 at £230, and now in the incumbency of the Rev. W. J. Dampier, M.A., who has a good residence, and 16 acres of glebe. Charles Du Cane, Esq., is the patron, but the great tithes belong to several impropiators, among whom are T. B. Western, Esq., C. J. Skingley, Esq., and the Rev. W. T. Bullock. The tithes are commuted for more than £700 per annum. They belonged to the abbey till 1223, when the Bishop of London appointed a vicar, and obliged the monks to give up for his maintenance part of the small tithes, and 20A. of glebe. The inhabitants of Little Coggeshall have been accommodated here with sittings, since their own two churches went to decay, viz., the Abbey Church and St. Nicholas's, the latter of which was built by the parishioners. Tradition says, the bells of the abbey church were sent to Kelvedon. The remains of the Abbey Church, with the ancient burial ground, have recently been presented to the vicar, in trust for the parishioners of Little Coggeshall, and efforts are now being made to restore part of the building as a place of worship. A New Cemetery has been formed adjoining Great Coggeshall Church yard, and a small chapel stands on the unconsecrated part of it.

The Rev. John Owen, D.D., a celebrated puritan and voluminous writer, was born here in 1616, and became a favourite preacher to Cromwell. He and his father held the vicarage here, as also did James Boys, who was remarkable for the "infinite number of sermons of his own composition which he left behind him," and for his Exposition of the Thirty-nine Articles. Bishop Mant, another eminent divine was vicar here.

Coggeshall has a large Independent Chapel, erected in 1710, and now under the ministry of the Rev. Bryan Dale. It has also a neat Baptist Chapel, erected in 1855, in lieu of an old one; a Friend's Meeting House, rebuilt in 1815; and a small Methodist Chapel. The town has several public schools, charities, and literary and provident institutions. Coggeshall Literary and Mechanics' Institution was established in 1847, and has lecture and reading rooms in Church street. It has about 130 members and 600 volumes. Mr. Thos. Simpson is its secretary. Here is also a Parochial Library, under the presidency of the vicar. It has about 70 members and 500 volumes. Coggeshall and United Parishes Agricultural Society was established in 1840, and meets alternately at the White Hart and Chapel Inns. T. S. Western, Esq. is the president, and J. C. Raven, Esq., secretary.

Hitcham's Charity and Free School.—The property belonging to this charity is vested in trust with the Master and Fellows of Pembroke Hall, Cambridge. Sir Robert Hitcham, Kt., of Ipswich, by will, in 1639, settled the castle and manors of Framlingham and Saxtead, in Suffolk, on the Master and Fellows of Pembroke Hall, in trust for the erection of a workhouse at Framlingham, "to set the poor of that parish, and those of Debenham and Coggeshall to work; and for the foundation of Almshouses and Schools at the same place, for the said poor, as well as for apprenticing poor children." For some years poor children and almspeople were sent from Coggeshall to Framlingham, but the distance rendering this expensive and inconvenient, law suits arose among the parties concerned; and it was appointed by the parliament of Oliver Cromwell, in 1658, that the College should pay to the town of Coggeshall £150 per annum; which sum should be paid to 12 trustees, in half-yearly moieties; and be employed by them in the support of a workhouse and a school; and in binding out apprentices, and in sending some of the grammar

scholars to Pembroke Hall College, Cambridge. But this arrangement was altered in 1722, when the estates left by the founder were divided among the three parishes for the separate benefit of each. The estates allotted to Coggeshall comprise about 290 acres of land, called Oldforth Wood, Bradley Wood, and Newhall Wood; and they are let for about £380 per annum, subject to the yearly payment of £9 to Debenham, and £21. 12s. to Levington and Nacton. They are still vested in trust with the Master and Fellows of Pembroke College, who have hitherto paid yearly to the local trustees of Coggeshall, only about £120 for the poor, and £80 for the schoolmaster. They have, however, lately expended about £800 in repairing the buildings on the estates, and £1200 in the erection of a handsome and commodious Free School at Coggeshall, in the early English style; and they are now (1861–2) applying to the Court of Chancery for a new scheme for the endowment of this school, and the application of the remainder of the income among the poor parishioners, who now receive only about £100 per annum. The Rev. W. J. Dampier, O. Hanbury, Esq., the Rev. J. Townsend, F. U. Pattison, Esq., and Messrs. Appleford, Sadler, Gardner, Giles, Dennis, Doubleday, Swinborne, and Westmacott, are the present local trustees. Hitherto they have allowed the schoolmaster £80 a year for teaching reading, writing, grammar, &c., to about 20 free scholars.

Here are also National Schools, built in 1840, and having dwellings for the teachers, and room for about 100 boys and 130 girls and infants. The British Schools were erected some years ago at the cost of £800, and have more than 200 pupils.

In 1580, Thomas Paycock left £200 to be laid out in lands, and the yearly proceeds to be divided among the poor of Great and Little Coggeshall in wood and white and red herrings. The property purchased with this legacy consisted of about 23 acres of land at Halstead, of which five acres have lately been sold for £1500, so that the yearly income has been increased from £58 to about £110, which is all distributed in money or clothing. Pursuant to a decree of Commissioners of Charitable Uses, in 1613, only £3 of the yearly income is distributed among the poor of Little Coggeshall, and the rest among the poor of Great Coggeshall. In 1586 an ancient chapel then used for the corn market, and a small garden adjoining, were conveyed to 18 trustees, for the use and benefit of the Companies of Fullers and Weavers until the purchase-money advanced by them was repaid, and afterwards for the benefit of the poor. This old Market House was pulled down in 1795, and the site of it and the garden now forms part of Market Hill. Belonging to the same trust are two cottages in Back Lane, let for £2. 10s., and the Clock Tower. The latter stands on land belonging to Crane's Charity, and the two cottages were built with £50 belonging to the poor, among whom the rent is divided, with Paycock's and other charities. Four Almshouses adjoining the above-named cottages were built with charity money on land given by Joseph Greenwood, in 1795. The inmates are appointed by the overseers and churchwardens.

In 1601, Johan Smith left £400 to be invested in the purchase of an annuity to be applied in weekly distributions of bread among the poor of Coggeshall and Bocking. In respect of this charity the two parishes have, in equal shares, a yearly rent-charge of £15 out of the rectory of East Tilbury. In 1618, Jane Gooday left for the poor of Great Coggeshall £30, which in 1718 was vested in a yearly rent-charge of 32s. out of a house in East Street. This annuity is applied in needful clothing for the aged poor. In 1664, Thomas Guyon left £200 for the most honest aged poor, and it was invested in a yearly rent-charge of £10. 8s. out of Windmill Fields. This is distributed in weekly doles of bread, together with a yearly rent-charge of £13, left by Sir Mark Guyon in 1678, out of Highfield Farm, now belonging to Richard M. White, Esq.

In 1669, Samuel Crane left, for the benefit of the poor, his house in Stoneham Street. The rent, about £6, is distributed with the wood money, as also is £9. 4s. per annum, derived from the rents of three tenements in Church Street, left by Anthony Hibben. The poor of Little Coggeshall have £8 a-year out of Roman's Farm at East Hanningfield, left by Ann Richardson.

COGGESHALL DIRECTORY.

COGGESHALL is a town on the river Blackwater, in the Northern division of the county, Witham division of Witham union, Coggeshall rural deanery, Colchester arch-deaconry, Braintree county court district, and Rochester diocese, and consists of two parishes, Great and Little Coggeshall, Great Coggeshall in Lexden hundred, and the hamlet of Little Coggeshall in Witham hundred, distant from Kelvedon station 21/2 miles, from Witham 7 north-east from London 44, from Colchester 91/2 west, from Halstead 8 south, and from Braintree 6 east. The town is partly on low ground bordering the river, whence it rises, and occupies the acclivity of a hill, from which it may have derived its ancient name-Sunned on. It is noted for the excellent quality of its land, and numerous powerful springs of pure water, many houses being supplied therewith by iron pipes; and for centuries past the land has been famous for the growth of garden seeds. There are many good buildings, amongst which is an extensive range where the refining and manufacture of the patent isinglass and gelatine a carried on, affording employment to a number of persons, and a great many young females are employed in the tambour lace trade. Here are also extensive silk manufactories; also breweries, maltings, and an iron foundry. There are two banks. The church of St. Peter is a fine building, in the Perpendicular style, with tower containing bells: the chancel was repaired in 1847, and the whole church is now under restoration. The register dates from October, 1561. The living is a vicarage, annual value £250, with residence and 20 acres of glebe, in the gift of Charles Lane, Esq MP, and held by the Rev. John Allen, BA, Brasenose College, Oxford. Sir Thomas B. Western, Bart, MP, and Henry and G. D. Skingley, Esqrs, are lay impropriators. The tithes are commuted at £417 3s. per annum; vicarial tithes commuted at £350 for Great Coggeshall, and £28 for Little Coggeshall. There are places of worship for Independents, Baptists, Society of Friends, and Methodists; also, three almshouses. There is a National school, with 100 children, and an infant school with accommodation for 90 children; also a school for Dissenters and a Sunday school connected with it. Sir Robert Hitcham's charity, for the education of 30 boys, is a handsome building in the Elizabethan style, in West-street, including residence for the master, the cost of which was bout £800: the endowment is considerable: the trustees the Master and Fellows of Pembroke College, Cambridge: Osgood Hanbury, Esq., treasurer. There are reading Room and Library in East-street, and a Mechanics Institute in Church-street. The town, which is ancient, was a Roman station, and some remains of antiquity have been found here. Holdfield Grange, a mile a half north-west, the seat of Osgood Hanbury, Esq is a handsome red brick mansion, with spacious conservatory and grounds: it is on the Roman road from Colchester Dunmow. The market, which is held on Thursday, was granted by Henry III., as also the right of holding a fair on Whit Monday. Here are gas works, and there are numerous charities. Charles Du Cane, Esq, MP, of Braxted Park (lord of the manor), Osgood Hanbury, Esq, Sir T B Western, Bart, MP, Rev W Bullock, and Captain Skingley are the chief landowners. The land is undulating, soil light, subsoil gravel, with several small streams running through it.

LITTLE COGGESHALL is on the southern side of the river Blackwater, connected with the town by a bridge. King Stephen and Queen Maud founded here a Cistercian abbey in 1142, dedicated to the Virgin Mary, which at the Dissolution was valued at £298 8s. per annum: the remains of this abbey are to be seen near the river: all the lands which belonged to this monastery at the time of its dissolution continued to be free from tithes, both great and small, whilst in the hands of the proprietors: the church of the monastery is entirely demolished; it stood in the Park, a field near the river. The church of Little Coggeshall, dedicated to St. Nicholas, was used as a barn near the site of the abbey, but was some years ago given up by the owner, the late J Bullock, Esq., to the vicar of the parish.

Great Coggeshall has an area of 2,605A. 2R. 37P, and a population of 3,680; Little Coggeshall, 999A. 1R. 4P, and a population of 429; the total population in 1861 was 4,109.

COGGESHALL is a town on the river Blackwater and a polling place for the Eastern division of the county, in Witham a division of Witham union, Coggeshall rural deanery, Colchester archdeaconry, Braintree county court district, and Rochester diocese, and consists of two parishes, Great Coggeshall in Lexden hundred, and Little Coggeshall in Witham hundred, distant from Kelvedon station 2 miles, from Witham 7 north-east, from London 44, from Colchester 9 west, from Halstead 8 south, and from Braintree 6 east. The town is partly on low ground bordering the river, whence it rises, and occupies the acclivity of a hill, from which it may have derived its ancient name-Sunnedon: it is noted for the excellent quality of its land, and numerous springs of pure water, many houses being supplied therewith by iron pipes, and for centuries past the land has been famous for the growth of garden seeds. There are many good buildings, amongst which is an extensive range where the refining and manufacture of the patent isinglass and gelatine is carried on, affording employment to a number of persons, and a great many young females are employed in the tambour lace trade. Here are extensive silk manufactories; also breweries, maltings, and an iron foundry. There are two banks. The church of St. Peter is a fine building, in the Perpendicular style, with aisles and transepts, and tower containing 6 bells, surmounted by a lofty spire: the chancel was repaired in 1847, and the whole church has been thoroughly restored there is an elegant stained-glass window in the chancel, also two others in the north and south transepts. The register dates from October, 1561. The living is a vicarage, yearly value £170, with residence and 20 acres of glebe, in the gift of Charles Du Cane, esq., and held by the Rev. William James Dampier, MA, of Christ's College, Cambridge. Sir Thomas B. Western, bart., and Henry and G. D. Skingley, esqrs., are the lay impropiators. The tithes are commuted at £417 3s. per annum; vicarial tithes commuted at £350 for Great Coggeshall, and £28 for Little Coggeshall. The cemetery is situated on an eminence at the back of the church, covering a space of three acres: it contains a neat chapel for the Dissenters. There is a National school, with 100 children, and an Infant school, with accommodation for 90 children; also a school for Dissenters, and a Sunday school connected with it. There are places of worship for Independents, Baptists, Society of Friends, and Methodists. Sir Robert Hitcham's Charity, for the education of 30 boys, is a handsome building in the Elizabethan style, in West-street, including residence for the master, the cost of which was about £800; the endowment is considerable: the trustees are the Master and Fellows of Pembroke College, Cambridge: Osgood Hanbury, esq., treasurer. There are three almshouses and numerous charities. There is a Reading Room and Library in Market end, and a Mechanics' Institute in Church-street. The market, which is held on Thursday, was granted by Henry III., as also the right of holding a fair on Whit Monday. Here are gas works. The town, which is very ancient, was a Roman station, and some remains of antiquity have been found here. Holdfield Grange, a mile and a half north-west, the seat of Osgood Hanbury, esq., is a handsome red brick mansion, with spacious conservatory, and grounds: it is on the Roman road from Colchester to Dunmow. Charles Du Cane, esq., who is lord of the manor, Osgood Hanbury, esq., Sir T. B. Western, bart, Rev W Bullock, and Captain Skingley are the chief landowners. The land is undulating; soil, light loam; subsoil, gravelly, with several small streams running through it.

Little Coggeshall is on the southern side of the river Blackwater, connected with the town by a bridge. King Stephen and Queen Maud founded here a Cistercian abbey in 1142, dedicated to the Virgin Mary, which at the Dissolution was valued at £298 8s. per annum: the remains of this abbey are to be seen near the river: all the lands which belonged to this monastery at the time of its dissolution continue to be free from tithes, both great and small, whilst cultivated in the hands of the proprietors: the church of the monastery is entirely demolished: it stood in the Park, a field near the river. The church of Little Coggeshall, dedicated to St. Nicholas, was used as a barn near the site of the abbey, but was some years ago given up by the owner, the late J. Bullock, to the vicar of the parish, and has recently been new roofed and thatched. Great Coggeshall has an area of 2,770 acres, and a population, in 1861, of 3,679; gross estimated rental, £11,620; rateable value, £8,654. Little Coggeshall has 830 acres of fertile land in a high state of cultivation; the soil is light, producing excellent crops of wheat, barley, turnips, and green crops generally; the population in 1861 was 429 (the total population in 1861 being 4,108); gross estimated rental, £2,924; rateable value, £2,447. COGGESHALL is a town on the river Blackwater, and a polling place for the Eastern division of the county, in Witham division of Witham union, Coggeshall rural deanery, Colchester archdeaconry, Braintree county court district, and Rochester diocese, and consists of two parishes, Great Coggeshall in Lexden hundred, and Little Coggeshall in Witham hundred, on opposite banks of the Blackwater, distant from Kelvedon station 2 miles, from Witham 7 north-east, from London 44, from Colchester 9 west, from Halstead 8 south, and from Braintree 6 east. The town is partly on low ground bordering the river, whence it rises, and occupies the acclivity of a hill, from which it may have derived its ancient name - Sunnedon: it is noted for the excellent quality of its land, and numerous springs of pure water, many houses being supplied therewith by iron pipes, and for centuries past the land has been famous for the growth of garden seeds. The town is lighted with gas supplied from works here. The church of St. Peter is a fine building, in the Perpendicular style, with chancel and chancel aisles, nave and aisles, and tower containing 6 bells: the chancel was repaired in 1851, and the whole church has been thoroughly restored: there is an elegant stained glass window in the chancel, also two others in the north and south chancel aisles. The register dates from October, 1584. The living is a vicarage, yearly value £170, with residence and 20 acres of glebe, in the gift of Charles Du Cane, esq., and held by the Rev. William James Dampier, M.A, of Christ College, Cambridge. Sir Thomas Sutton Western, bart, and Henry Skingley, esq, and Major Skingley, are the lay impropriators. The tithes are commuted at £378 per annum; vicarial tithes commuted at £350 for Great Coggeshall, and £28 for Little Coggeshall. The cemetery is situated on an eminence at the back of the church, covering a space of 3 acres; it contains a chapel for Dissenters. There is a National school, with accommodation for 300 children; also a school for Dissenters, and a Sunday school connected with it. There are places of worship for Independents, Baptists, Society of Friends, and Methodists. Sir Robert Hitcham's Charity is for the education of 30 boys: the school is a handsome building in the Elizabethan style, in West street, including residence for the master, the cost of which was about £800; the endow rent is considerable: the trustees are the Master and Fellows of Pembroke College, Cambridge: Osgood Hanbury, esq., treasurer. There are three almshouses and numerous charities. There is a reading room and library in

Bridge street, and a Mechanics' Institute in Church street. The market, which is held on Thursday, was granted by Henry III, as also the right of holding a fair on Whit Monday. There are many good buildings, amongst which is an extensive range where the refining and manufacture of the patent isinglass and gelatine is carried on, affording employment to a number of persons: a great many young females are employed in the tambour lace trade; here are silk manufacturers; also breweries, maltings, and an iron foundry. There are two banks. The town, which is very ancient, was a Roman station, and some remains of antiquity have been found here. Holdfield Grange, a mile and a half north-west, the seat of Osgood Hanbury, esq., is a handsome red brick mansion, with spacious conservatory and grounds: it is on the Roman road from Colchester to Dunmow. The charities for distribution amount to £278 yearly. Charles Du Cane, esq., who is lord of the manor, Osgood Hanbury, esq, Sir T Sutton Western, bart, Rev W Bullock, and Major and Henry Skingley, are the chief land-owners. The land is undulating; soil, light loam; subsoil, gravelly, with several small streams running through it.

Little Coggeshall is on the southern bank of the river Blackwater, connected with the town by a bridge. King Stephen and Queen Maud founded here a Cistercian abbey in 1142, dedicated to the Virgin Mary, which at the Dissolution was valued at £298 8s. per annum: the remains of this abbey are to be seen near the river: all the lands which belonged to this monastery at the time of its dissolution continue to be free from tithes, both great and small, whilst cultivated in the hands of the proprietors: the church of the monastery is entirely demolished: it stood in the Park, a field near the river. The church of Little Coggeshall, dedicated to St. Nicholas, was used as a barn near the site of the abbey, but was some years ago given up by the owner, the late J. Bullock, to the vicar of the parish, and has been newly roofed and thatched.

Great Coggeshall has an area of 2,770 acres; gross estimated rental, £12,018; rateable value, £9,522; and a population in 1871, of 3,454. Little Coggeshall has 830 acres of fertile land in a high state of cultivation; the soil is light, producing excellent crops of wheat, barley, turnips, and green crops generally; gross estimated rental, £3,012; rateable value, £2,613; the population in 1871 was 376 (the total population in 1871 being 3,830). 

Kelly 1882

COGGESHALL is a town on the river Blackwater and a polling place for the Eastern division of the county, in Witham division and Braintree union and county court district, Coggeshall rural deanery, Colchester archdeaconry and St. Albans diocese and consists of two parishes, Great Coggeshall in Lexden hundred and Little Coggeshall in Witham hundred, on opposite banks of the Blackwater, connected by an ancient bridge of 3 arches, distant from Kelvedon station 2 miles, from Witham 7 north-east, from London 44, from Colchester 9 west, from Halstead 8 south and from Braintree 6 east.

The town stands partly on low ground bordering the river, whence it rises and occupies the acclivity of a hill, from which it may have derived its ancient name Sunnedon; it is noted for its numerous springs of pure water, many houses being supplied there-with by iron pipes and for centuries past the land has been famous for the growth of garden seeds. The town is lighted with gas.

The church of St. Peter is a fine building entirely in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel with aisles, nave, south porch and a battlemented tower with angle turret at the west end containing 8 bells, six of which are dated 1681, 1692, 1733, 1733, 1757 and 1806: the nave is divided from the north and south aisles by an arcade of 5 lofty bays: the roofs of chancel and nave are of one height and there is a clerestory of eight three light windows: the chancel was repaired in 1851 and the whole church has been thoroughly restored; there is a stained window in the chancel and five others: two side screens of richly carved oak have lately been added and a richly decorated reredos was placed in the church in 1880 as a memorial to the late Rev. W. J. Dampier, for 33 years vicar of this parish: it consists of groups of figures representing scriptural events in sculptured Caen stone, beneath richly sculptured canopies of Derbyshire alabaster; flanking and dividing these groups are small niches in which are placed the figures of arch-angels: the great east window of seven lights is a magnificent work of modern art and was the gift of the Hanbury family, of Holfield Grange: the subjects are all from the life of our Lord: the west tower window is the gift of Major G. D. Skingley. The register dates from October, 1584 and is in fair condition. The living is a vicarage, yearly value £200, with residence and 20 acres of glebe, in the gift of Sir Charles Du Cane and held by the Rev. Chas. Philip Greene B.A. of Melbourne University, Australia. Sir Thomas C. C. Western bart. and Henry Skingley esq. and Major Skingley are the lay impropriators. The tithes are commuted at £378 yearly; vicarial tithes commuted at £350 for Great Coggeshall and 28 for Little Coggeshall.

The Congregational Chapel is a large building, erected in 1715 and has been enlarged several times, the last enlargement being in 1865: at the back of the chapel there are spacious schoolrooms affording space for 600 children. An Independent chapel is said to have been founded here by Dr. John Owen, chaplain to Cromwell: there is also a manse in East street, purchased by the congregation as a residence for the minister. There are also places of worship for Baptists, Society of Friends and Methodists. A cemetery of 3 acres is situated at the back of the church and contains a chapel for Dissenters. There are three almshouses, founded in 1795. There is a reading room with a library in Bridge street and a Mechanics' institute in Church street.

The market, which is obsolete, was granted by Henry III. as also the right of holding a fair on Whit Monday. There are many good buildings, amongst which is an extensive range where the refining and manufacture of patent isinglass and gelatine is carried on: there is also a sewing factory, breweries, maltings and an iron foundry. There are two banks viz.: the Essex Bank (Sparrow & Co.) and the London and County Banking Co. (Limited).

The town, which is very ancient, was a Roman station and some ancient remains have been found here. Holfield Grange, a mile and a half north-west, on the Roman road from Colchester to Dunmow, the property of Osgood Hanbury esq. is a Tudor mansion recently erected, but at present unoccupied. The charities for distribution amount to £278 yearly. Sir Charles Du Cane, who is lord of the manor, Osgood Hanbury esq. Sir T. C. C. Western bart. Major and Henry Skingley and Sidney Pattisson esq. J.P. are the chief landowners. The land is undulating; soil, light loam; subsoil, gravelly, with several small streams running through it.

Little Coggeshall is on the southern bank of the river Blackwater and is connected with Great Coggeshall by a bridge. King Stephen and Queen Maud, heiress of Eustace, Earl of Boulogne, who held these manors of the Conqueror, founded here a Cistercian abbey in 1142, dedicated to the Virgin Mary, which at the Dissolution was valued at £298 8s. a year: the remains of this abbey, situated near the river afford the earliest instance of mediæval brickwork at present met with in this country; the earliest portion is a massive fragment once forming part of an arcade; various carved stones, including a Transition Norman capital, lie scattered about

and there are two thick walls, also apparently belonging to the abbey buildings; the existing inequalities of the ground, extending some distance to the left, seem to indicate that the foundations covered a considerable area. Near these ruins, on the right bank of the little river Blackwater is a picturesque old gabled house, with groups of clustered chimneys, built by a grandee of Henry VIII. partly on the site and with the materials of the abbey: the river itself flows in an artificial bed constructed by the monks in order to secure a head of water for their mill and is crossed by an old bridge, at the corner of which stands a dwelling known as the "Rood House," probably marking by this name the former site of a cross or rood at the entrance to the abbey demesnes: the whole of this property now belongs to Sidney Pattisson esq. All the lands which belonged to it at the time of its dissolution continue to be free from tithes, both great and small, whilst cultivated in the hands of the proprietors: the church of the monastery, which is entirely demolished, stood in the park in a field near the river. The ruined church of Little Coggeshall, dedicated to St. Nicholas and standing near the site of the abbey, is a simple rectangular building constructed of flint and rubble, with dressings of brick around the lancet-shaped windows: at the east end are sedilia and here and there are traces of decorative painting; it has been used as a barn, but was some years ago given up by the owner, the late J. Bullock, to the vicar of the parish. Great Coggeshall has an area of 2,770 acres; rateable value, £8,423; and a population in 1881 of 2,998. Little Coggeshall has 830 acres of fertile land in a high state of cultivation; the soil is light, producing excellent crops of wheat, barley, turnips and green crops generally; rateable value, £2,102; the population in 1881 was 363 (the total population of Great and Little Coggeshall in 1881 being 3,361). COGGESHALL is a town on the river Blackwater and a polling place for the Eastern division of the county, in Witham division and Braintree union and county court district, Coggeshall rural deanery, Colchester archdeaconry and St. Albans diocese and consists of two parishes, Great Coggeshall in Lexden hundred and Little Coggeshall in Witham hundred, on opposite banks of the Blackwater, connected by an ancient bridge of 3 arches, distant from Kelvedon station 2 miles, from Witham 7 north-east, from London 44, from Colchester 9 west, from Halstead 8 south and from Braintree 6 east.

The town stands partly on low ground bordering the river, whence it rises and occupies the acclivity of a hill, from which it may have derived its ancient name-Sunnedon; it is noted for its numerous springs of pure water, many houses being supplied there- with by iron pipes and for centuries past the land has been famous for the growth of garden seeds. The town is lighted with gas.

The church of St. Peter is a fine building entirely in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel with aisles, nave, south porch and a battlemented tower with angle turret at the west end containing 8 bells, six of which are dated 1681, 1692, 1733, 1733, 1757 and 1806: the nave is divided from the north and south aisles by an arcade of 5 lofty bays: the roofs of chancel and nave are of one height and there is a clerestory of eight three light windows: the chancel was repaired in 1851 and the whole church has been thoroughly restored; there is a stained window in the chancel and five others: two side screens of richly carved oak have lately been added and a richly decorated reredos was placed in the church in 1880 as a memorial to the late Rev W. J. Dampier, for 33 years vicar of this parish: it consists of groups of figures representing scriptural events in sculptured Caen stone, beneath richly sculptured canopies of Derbyshire alabaster; flanking and dividing these groups are small niches in which are placed the figures of archangels: the great east window of seven lights is a magnificent work of modern art and was the gift of the Hanbury family, of Holfield Grange: the subjects are all from the life of our Lord: the west tower window is the gift of Major G D Skingley. The register dates from October, 1584 and is in fair condition. The living is a vicarage, yearly value £200, with residence and 20 acres of glebe, in the gift of Sir Charles Du Cane and held by the Rev Chas. Philip Greene BA of Melbourne University, Australia. Sir Thomas C. C. Western bart and Henry Skingley esq and Major Skingley are the lay impropriators. The tithes are commuted at £378 yearly; vicarial tithes commuted at £350 for Great Coggeshall and 28 for Little Coggeshall.

The Congregational Chapel is a large building, erected in 1715 and has been enlarged several times, the last enlargement being in 1865: at the back of the chapel there are spacious schoolrooms affording space for 600 children. An Independent chapel is said to have been founded here by Dr John Owen, chaplain to Cromwell: there is also a manse in East street, purchased by the congregation as a residence for the minister. There are also places of worship for Baptists, Society of Friends and Methodists. A cemetery of 3 acres is situated at the back of the church and contains a chapel for Dissenters.

There are three alms- houses, founded in 1795. There is a reading room with a library in Bridge street and a Mechanics' institute in Church street. The market, which is obsolete, was granted by Henry III. as also the right of holding a fair on Whit Monday. There are many good buildings, amongst which is an extensive range where the refining and manufacture of patent isinglass and gelatine is carried on: there is also a sewing factory, breweries, maltings and an iron foundry. There are two banks viz: the Essex Bank (Sparrow & Co.) and the London and County Banking Co. (Limited). The town, which is very ancient, was a Roman station and some ancient remains have been found here.

Holfield Grange, a mile and a half north-west, on the Roman road from Colchester to Dunmow, the property of Osgood Hanbury esq is a Tudor mansion recently erected, but at present unoccupied. The charities for distribution amount to £278 yearly. Sir Charles Du Cane, who is lord of the manor, Osgood Hanbury esq. Sir T. C. C. Western bart Major and Henry Skingley and Sidney Pattisson esq. J.P. are the chief landowners. The land is undulating; soil, light loam; subsoil, gravelly, with several small streams running through it.

Little Coggeshall is on the southern bank of the river Blackwater and is connected with Great Coggeshall by a bridge. King Stephen and Queen Maud, heiress of Eustace, Earl of Boulogne, who held these manors of the Conqueror, founded here a Cistercian abbey in 1142, dedicated to the Virgin Mary, which at the Dissolution was valued at £298 8s. a year: the remains of this abbey, situated near the river afford the earliest instance of medieval brickwork at present met with in this country; the earliest portion is a massive fragment once forming part of an arcade; various carved

stones, including a Transition Norman capital, lie scattered about and there are two thick walls, also apparently belonging to the abbey buildings; the existing inequalities of the ground, extending some distance to the left, seem to indicate that the foundations covered a considerable area. Near these ruins, on the right bank of the little river Blackwater is a picturesque old gabled house, with groups of clustered chimneys, built by a grandee of Henry VIII. partly on the site and with the materials of the abbey: the river itself flows in an artificial bed constructed by the monks in order to secure a head of water for their mill and is crossed by an old bridge, at the corner of which stands a dwelling known as the "Rood House," probably marking by this name the former site of a cross or rood at the entrance to the abbey demesnes: the whole of this property now belongs to Sidney Pattisson esq. All the lands which belonged to it at the time of its dissolution continue to be free from tithes, both great and small, whilst cultivated in the hands of the proprietors: the church of the monastery, which is entirely demolished, stood in the park in a field near the river. The ruined church of Little Coggeshall, dedicated to St. Nicholas and standing near the site of the abbey, is a simple rectangular building constructed of flint and rubble, with dressings of brick around the lancet- shaped windows: at the east end are sedilia and here and there are traces of decorative painting; it has been used as a barn, but was some years ago given up by the owner, the late J. Bullock, to the vicar of the parish. Great Coggeshall has an area of 2,770 acres; rateable value, £8,423; and a population in 1881 of 2,998. Little Coggeshall has 830 acres of fertile land in a high state of cultivation; the soil is light, producing excellent crops of wheat, barley, turnips and green crops generally; rateable value, £2,102; the population in 1881 was 363 (the total population of Great and Little Coggeshall in 1881 being 3,361). Kelly 1892

COGGESHALL is a town consisting of two parishes, Great Coggeshall in Lexden hundred and Little Coggeshall in Witham hundred, on opposite banks of the river Black- water, connected by an ancient bridge of three arches, and distant from Kelvedon station on the Great Eastern railway 2 miles, from Witham 7 north-east, from London 44, from Colchester 9 west, from Halstead 8 south and from Braintree 6 east, in the Eastern division of the county, Witham petty sessional division, Braintree union and county court district, and in the rural deanery of Coggeshall, archdeaconry of Colchester and diocese of St. Albans.

The town, anciently a Roman station, stands partly on low ground bordering the river, whence it rises and occupies the acclivity of a hill, from which it may have derived its earlier name of "Sunnedon." it is noted for its numerous springs of pure water, many houses being supplied therewith by iron pipes, and for centuries past the land has been famous for the growth of garden seeds: the town is lighted with gas, from works situated in East street, the property of a company.

The church of St. Peter ad Vincula is a fine building of stone and flint, entirely in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel with aisles, clerestoried nave of five bays, aisles, south porch and an embattled western tower with angle turret, containing 8 bells, 6 of which are dated 1681, 1692, 1733, 1733, 1757, 1806; the 2 latest were cast in 1876: there are three sedilia and a piscina in the south chancel aisle, where also is a memorial; two windows, erected in 1888, to Joseph Smith Surridge; in the north aisle is another, inserted at the same time to Major George Deeks Skingley, who presented the stained west window; and there are several other stained windows, including that at the east end, given by the Hanbury family, of Holfield Grange: two side screens of richly carved oak have been added and a richly decorated reredos was placed in the church in 1880 as a memorial to the late Rev W. J. Dampier, for 33 years vicar of this parish; it consists of groups of figures representing scriptural events in sculptured Caen stone, beneath richly sculptured canopies of Derbyshire alabaster; flanking and dividing these groups are small niches in which are placed the figures of archangels: the carved oak pulpit was presented in 1871 by W. B. Polley esq: the font, which is Early English, was formerly in Pattiswick church, but was removed, and after being used some time for other purposes was presented to Coggeshall church in 1852: the chancel was repaired in 1851, and the church has been fully re- stored: there are 1,000 sittings. The register dates from October, 1584, and is in fair condition. The living is a vicarage, yearly value from tithe rent-charge £336, with residence and 22 acres of glebe, net. yearly value £240, in the gift. of C. H. Copley Du Cane esq and held since 1885 by the Rev Hubert Mornington. Patch MA of Clare College, Cambridge. Sir Thomas C. C. Western bart. and Walter

Skingley esq and Mrs Annie Skingley are the lay impropiators. The Congregational chapel, erected in 1715, has been several times enlarged, the last enlargement being in 1865: at the back of the chapel there are spacious school rooms for 600 children, and additional class rooms and a lecture hall are now (1890) in course of erection. An Independent chapel is said to have been founded here by Dr John Owen, chaplain to the Protector, Oliver Cromwell; there is a manse in East street, purchased by the congregation as a residence for the minister. There are also Baptist and Wesleyan chapels and a meeting house for the Society of Friends. A Cemetery of 3 acres, situated at the back of the church, was formed and laid out in 1855-6, at a cost of £1,500, and contains a chapel for Dissenters: it is under the control of a Burial Board of nine members. There are six almshouses, founded in 1795, and the charities for distribution among the general poor amount to £278 yearly. The market, which is scarcely more than nominal, was granted by Henry III. as also the right of holding a fair on Whit-Tuesday.

There are two reading rooms with libraries, one of which is in connection with the Mechanics' institute, in Church street. The refining and manufacture of patent isinglass and gelatine is carried on: there is also a sewing factory, breweries and maltings. There are two banks, viz.: the Essex Bank (Sparrow and Co.) and the London and County Banking Co. Limited. A handsome tower, containing a clock and surmounted by a cupola, was erected in: 1887.

Holfield Grange, a mile and a half north-west, on the Roman road from Colchester to Dunmow, the property of the trustees of the late Osgood Beauchamp Hanbury esq is a modern Tudor mansion now in the occupation of Sir George C. Lampson bart. The trustees of the late Sir Charles Du Cane K.C.M.G. (d. 1889), who are lords of the manor, the trustees of the late Osgood Beauchamp Hanbury esq Sir Thomas Charles Callis Western bart. Walter Skingley esq and Mrs Annie Skingley, of Felix Hall, Kelvedon, are the chief landowners. The land is undulating; soil, light loam; subsoil, gravelly, with several small streams running through it. Little Coggeshall, on the southern bank of the river Blackwater, is connected with Great Coggeshall by a bridge. King Stephen and Queen

Maud, heiress of Eustace, Earl of Boulogne, who held these manors of the Conqueror, founded here a Cistercian abbey in 1142, dedicated to the Virgin Mary and colonized from Savigny, which at the Dissolution was valued at £298 8s. a year: the remains of this abbey, situated near the river, afford the earliest instance of medieval brick work at present met with in this country; the most ancient portion being a massive fragment once forming part of an arcade: various carved stones, including a Transition Norman capital, lie scattered about and there are two thick walls, also apparently belonging to the abbey buildings: the existing inequalities of the ground, extending some distance to the left, seem to indicate that the foundations covered a considerable area. Near these ruins, on the right bank of the little river Blackwater, is a picturesque old gabled house, with groups of clustered chimneys, built in the reign of Henry VIII. partly on the site and with the materials of the abbey: the river flows in an artificial bed constructed by the monks in order to secure a head of water for their mill and is crossed by an old bridge, at the corner of which stands a dwelling known as the "Rood House," probably marking by this name the former site of a cross or rood at the entrance to the abbey demesnes. All the lands which belonged to it at the time of its dissolution continue to be free from tithes, both great and small, whilst I cultivated in the hands of the proprietors: the church of the monastery, which is entirely demolished, stood in the park in a field near the river. The ruined church of Little Coggeshall, dedicated to St. Nicholas and standing near the site of the abbey, is a simple rectangular building constructed of flint and rubble, with dressings of brick around the lancet-shaped windows: at the east end are sedilia and here and there are traces of decorative painting: it has been used as a barn, but was some years ago given up by the owner, the late J. Bullock, to the vicar of the parish.

Kelly 1895

COGGESHALL is a town consisting of two parishes, Great Coggeshall in Lexden hundred and Little Coggeshall in Witham hundred, on opposite banks of the river Blackwater, connected by an ancient bridge of three arches, and distant from Kelvedon station on the Great Eastern railway 2 miles, from Witham 7 north-east, from Colchester 9 west, from Halstead 8 south and from Braintree 6 east and from London 44, in the Eastern division of the county, Witham petty sessional division, Braintree union and county court district, in the rural deanery of Coggeshall, archdeaconry of Colchester and diocese of St. Albans. The town, anciently a Roman station, stands partly on low ground bordering the river, whence it rises and occupies the acclivity of a hill, from which it may have derived its earlier name of "Sunnedon;" it is noted for its numerous springs of pure water, many houses being supplied therewith by iron pipes, and for centuries past the land has been famous for the growth of garden seeds: the town is lighted with gas, from works in East street, the property of a company. The church of St. Peter ad Vincula is a fine building of stone and flint, entirely in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel with aisles, clerestoried nave of five bays, aisles, south porch and an embattled western tower with angle turret, containing 8 bells, 6 of which are dated 1681, 1692, 1733, 1733, 1757, 1806; the 2 latest were cast in 1876: there are three sedilia and a piscina in the south chancel aisle, where also is a memorial; two windows, erected in 1888, to Joseph Smith Surrudge; in the north aisle is another, inserted at the same time to Major George Deeks Skingley, who presented the stained west window; and there are several other stained windows, including that at the east end, given by the Hanbury family, of Holfield Grange: a very handsome carved oak screen has been erected to the church, and a richly decorated reredos was placed in the church in 1880 as a memorial to the late Rev W. J. Dampier, for 33 years vicar of this parish; it consists of groups of figures representing scriptural events in sculptured Caen stone, beneath richly sculptured canopies of Derbyshire alabaster; flanking and dividing these groups are small niches in which are placed the figures of archangels: the carved oak pulpit was executed in 1871 by Mr W. B. Polley: the font, which is Early English, was formerly in Pattiswick church, but was removed, and after being used some time for other purposes was presented to Coggeshall church in 1852: the chancel was repaired in 1851, and the church has been fully restored: there are 1,000 sittings. The register dates from October, 1584, and is in fair condition. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £255, net yearly value £315, with residence and 22 acres of glebe, in the gift of C. H. Copley Du Cane esq. and held since 1892 by the Rev Charles Craigie Mills M.A. of University College, Oxford. Sir Thomas C. C. Western bart. Walter Skingley esq. and Mrs Annie Skingley are the lay impropiators. The Congregational chapel, erected in 1715, has been several times enlarged, the last enlargement being in 1865: at the back of the chapel there are spacious school rooms for 600 children, additional class rooms and a lecture hall were added in 1890. An Independent chapel is said to have been founded here by Dr. John Owen, chaplain to the Protector, Oliver Cromwell; there is a manse in East street, purchased by the congregation as a residence for the minister. There are also Baptist and Wesleyan chapels and a meeting house for the Society of Friends. A Cemetery of 3 acres, at the back of the church, was formed and laid out in 1855-6, at a cost of £1,500, and contains a chapel for Dissenters: it is under the control of a Burial Board of nine members. The market, which is scarcely more than nominal, was granted by Henry III. as also the right of holding a fair on Whit-Tuesday. There are two reading rooms, that in Church street having a library attached. The refining and manufacture of patent isinglass and gelatine is carried on, and there is a sewing factory, breweries and maltings. The Essex Bank (Sparrow and Co.) and the London and County Banking Co. Limited have branches here. A tower, containing a clock and surmounted by a cupola, was erected in 1887. Holfield Grange, a mile and a half north-west, on the Roman road from Colchester to Dunmow, the property and residence of Mrs Reginald Duke Hill, is a modern Tudor mansion. There are six almshouses, founded in 1795, and the charities for distribution among the general poor amount to £278 yearly. The trustees of the late Sir Charles Du Cane K.C.M.G. (d. 1889), who are lords of the manor, Mrs Reginald Duke Hill, Sir Thomas Charles Callis Western bart. Walter Skingley esq. and Mrs Annie Skingley, of Felix Hall, Kelvedon, are the chief landowners. The land is undulating; soil, light loam; subsoil, gravelly, with several small streams running through it.

LITTLE COGGESHALL, on the southern bank of the river Blackwater, is connected with Great Coggeshall by a bridge. King Stephen and Queen Maud, heiress of Eustace, Earl of Boulogne, who held these manors of the Conqueror, founded here a Cistercian abbey in 1142, dedicated to the Virgin Mary and colonized from Savigny, which at the Dissolution was valued at £298 8s. a year: the remains of this abbey, situated near the river, afford the earliest instance of medieval brickwork at present met with

in this country; the most ancient portion being a massive fragment once forming part of an arcade: various carved stones, including a Transition Norman capital, lie scattered about and there are two thick walls, also apparently belonging to the abbey buildings: the existing inequalities of the ground, extending some distance to the left, seem to indicate that the foundations covered a considerable area. Near these ruins, on the right bank of the little river Blackwater, is a picturesque old gabled house, with groups of clustered chimneys, built in the reign of Henry VIII. partly on the site and with the materials of the abbey: the river flows in an artificial bed constructed by the monks in order to secure a head of water for their mill and is crossed by an old bridge, at the corner of which stands a dwelling known as the "Rood House," probably marking by this name the former site of a cross or rood at the entrance to the abbey demesnes. All the lands which belonged to it at the time of its dissolution continue to be free from tithes, both great and small, whilst cultivated in the hands of the proprietors: the church of the monastery, which is entirely demolished, stood in the park in a field near the river. The ruined church of Little Coggeshall, dedicated to St. Nicholas and standing near the site of the abbey, is a simple rectangular building constructed of flint and rubble, with dressings of brick around the lancet-shaped windows: at the east end are sedilia and here and there are traces of decorative painting: it has been used as a barn, but was some years ago given up by the owner, the late J. Bullock, to the vicar of the parish.

Great Coggeshall has an area of 2,770 acres of land and 13 of water; rateable value, £6,958; the population in 1891 was 2,730.

Little Coggeshall has 830 acres of fertile land in a high state of cultivation; the soil is light, producing excellent crops of wheat, barley, turnips and green crops generally; rateable value, 1,594; the population in 1891 was 379 (the total population of Great and Little Coggeshall in 1891 being 3,109).

Kelly 1899

COGGESHALL is a town consisting of two parishes. Great Coggeshall in Lexden hundred and Little Coggeshall in Witham hundred, on opposite banks of the river Blackwater, connected by an ancient bridge of three arches, and distant from Kelvedon station on the Great Eastern railway 2 miles, from Witham 7 north-east, from Colchester 9 west, from Halstead 8 south and from Braintree 6 east and from London 44, in the Eastern division of the county, Witham petty sessional division, Braintree union and county court district, in the rural deanery of Coggeshall, archdeaconry of Colchester and diocese of St. Albans. The town, anciently a Roman station, stands partly on low ground bordering the river, whence it rises and occupies the acclivity of a hill, from which it may have derived its earlier name of "Sunnedon;" it is noted for its numerous springs of pure water, many houses being supplied therewith by iron pipes, and for centuries past the land has been famous for the growth of garden seeds: the town is lighted with gas, from works in East street, the property of a company. The church of St. Peter ad Vincula is a fine building of stone and flint, entirely in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel with aisles, clerestoried nave of five bays, aisles, south porch and an embattled western tower with angle turret, containing 8 bells, 6 of which are dated 1681, 1692, 1733, 1733, 1757, 1806; the 2 latest were cast in 1876: there are three sedilia and a piscina in the south chancel aisle, where also is a memorial; two windows, erected in 1888, to Joseph Smith Surridge; in the north aisle is another, inserted at the same time to Major George Decks Skingley, who presented the stained west window; and there are several other stained windows, including that at the east end, given by the Hanbury family, of Holfield Grange: a very handsome carved oak screen has been erected to the church, and a richly decorated reredos was placed in the church in 1880 as a memorial to the late Rev W. J. Dampier, for 33 years vicar of this parish; it consists of groups of figures representing scriptural events in sculptured Caen stone, beneath richly carved canopies of Derbyshire alabaster; flanking and dividing these groups are small niches in which are placed the figures of archangels: the carved oak pulpit was executed in 1871 by Mr W. B. Polley: the font, which is Early English, was formerly in Pattiswick church, but was removed, and after being used some time for other purposes was presented to Coggeshall church in 1852: the chancel was repaired in 1851, and the church has been fully restored: there are 1,000 sittings. The register dates from October, 1584, and is in fair condition. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £200, with residence and 22 acres of glebe, in the gift of C. H. Copley Du Cane esq and held since 1892 by the Rev Charles Craigie Mills M.A. of University College, Oxford. Sir Thomas C. C. Western bart. Walter Skingley esq Mrs Annie Skingley and Mrs Reginald Hill are the lay impropiators. The Congregational chapel, erected in 1715, has been several times enlarged, the last enlargement being in 1865: at the back of the chapel there are spacious school rooms for 600 children, additional class rooms and a lecture hall were added in 1890. An Independent chapel is said to have been founded here by Dr. John Owen, chaplain to the Protector, Oliver Cromwell; there is a manse in East street, purchased by the congregation as a residence for the minister. There are also Baptist and Wesleyan chapels and a meeting house for the Society of Friends. A Cemetery of 3 acres, at the back of the church, was formed and laid out in 1855-6, at a cost of £1,500, and contains a chapel for Dissenters: it is now controlled by the Parish Council. The market, which is scarcely more than nominal, was granted by Henry III. as also the right of holding a fair on Whit-Tuesday. There is a reading room in Church street, with a library attached. The refining and manufacture of patent isinglass and gelatine is carried on, and there is a sewing factory, breweries and maltings. The Essex Bank (Barclay and Co. Limited) and the London and County Banking Co. Limited have branches here. A tower, containing a clock and surmounted by a cupola, was erected in 1887. Holfield Grange, a mile and a half north-west, on the Roman road from Colchester to Dunmow, the property and residence of Mrs Reginald Duke Hill, is a modern-Tudor mansion. There are six almshouses, founded in 1795, and five of recent construction: the charities for distribution among the general poor amount to £278 yearly, and there are other charities, comprising four tenements in Church street and Stoneham street. C. H. Copley Du Cane esq of Braxted Park, Witham, is lord of the manor, Mrs Reginald Duke Hill, Sir Thomas Charles Callis Western bart. Walter Skingley esq and Mrs Annie Skingley, of Felix Hall, Kelvedon, are the chief landowners. The land is undulating; soil, light loam; subsoil. gravelly, with several small streams running through it.

LITTLE COGGESHALL, on the southern bank of the river Blackwater, is connected with Great Coggeshall by a bridge. King Stephen and. Queen Maud, heiress of Eustace, Earl of Boulogne; who held these manors of the Conqueror, founded here a Cistercian abbey in 1142, dedicated to

the Virgin Mary and colonized from Savigny, which at the Dissolution was valued at £298 8s. a year: the remains of this abbey, situated near the river, afford the earliest instance of medieval brickwork at present met with in this country; the most ancient portion being a massive fragment once forming part of an arcade: various carved stones, including a Transition Norman capital, lie scattered about and there are two thick walls, also apparently belonging to the abbey buildings: the existing inequalities of the ground, extending some distance to the left, seem to indicate that the foundations covered a considerable area. Near these ruins, on the right bank of the little river Blackwater, is a picturesque old gabled house, with groups of clustered chimneys. built in the reign of Henry VIII. partly on the site and with the materials of the abbey: the river flows in an artificial bed constructed by the monks in order to secure a head of water for their mill and is crossed by an old bridge, at the corner of which stands a dwelling known as the "Rood House," probably marking by this name the former site of a cross or rood at the entrance to the abbey demesnes. All the lands which belonged to it at the time of its dissolution continue to be free from tithes, both great and small, whilst cultivated in the hands of the proprietors: the church of the monastery, which is entirely demolished, stood in the park in a field near the river. The existing church of Little Coggeshall, dedicated to St. Nicholas and standing near the site of the abbey, is a simple rectangular building constructed of flint and rubble, with dressings of brick around the lancet-shaped windows: at the east end are sedilia and here and there are traces of decorative painting: it had been used as a barn, but was some years ago given up by the owner, the late Mr J. Bullock, to the vicar of the parish, and was restored in 1897 from designs of Mr G. F. Bodley A.R.A. architect, at a cost of £1,100; there are 150 sittings.

Great Coggeshall has an area of 2,619 acres of land and 13 of water; rateable value, £6,832; the population in 1891 was 2,730.

Little Coggeshall has 1,009 acres of fertile land in a high state of cultivation, and 11 of water; the soil is light, producing excellent crops of wheat, barley, turnips and green crops generally; assessable value, 1,159; the population in 1891 was 379 (the total population of Great and Little Coggeshall in 1891 being 3,109).

Kelly 1902

COGGESHALL is a town consisting of two parishes, Great Coggeshall in Lexden hundred and Little Coggeshall in Witham hundred, on opposite banks of the river Blackwater, connected by an ancient bridge of three arches, and distant from Kelvedon station on the Great Eastern railway 2 miles, from Witham 7 north-east, from Colchester 9 west, from Halstead 8 south and from Braintree 6 east and from London 44, in the Eastern division of the county, Witham petty sessional division, Braintree union and county court district, in the rural deanery of Coggeshall, archdeaconry of Colchester and diocese St. Albans.

The town, anciently a Roman station, stands partly on low ground bordering the river, whence it rises and occupies the acclivity of a hill, from which it may have derived its earlier name of "Sunnedon;" it is noted for its numerous springs of pure water, many houses being supplied therewith by iron pipes, and for centuries past the land has been famous for the growth of garden seeds: the town is lighted with gas, from works in East street, the property of a company.

The church of St. Peter ad Vincula is a fine building of stone and flint, entirely in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel with aisles, clerestoried nave of five bays, aisles, south porch and an embattled western tower with angle turret, containing 8 bells, 6 of which are dated 1681, 1692, 1733, 1733, 1757, 1806; the 2 latest were cast in 1876: there are three sedilia and a piscina in the south chancel aisle, where also is a memorial; two windows, erected in 1888, to Joseph Smith Surridge; in the north aisle is another, inserted at the same time to Major George Deeks Skingley, who presented the stained west window; and there are several other stained windows, including that at the east end, given by the Hanbury family, of Holfield Grange: a very handsome carved oak screen has been erected to the church, and a richly decorated reredos was placed in the church in 1880 as a memorial to the late Rev. W. J. Dampier, for 33 years vicar of this parish; it consists of groups of figures representing scriptural events in sculptured Caen stone, beneath richly carved canopies of Derbyshire alabaster; flanking and dividing these groups are small niches in which are placed the figures of archangels: the carved oak pulpit was executed in 1871 by Mr WB Polley: the font, which is Early English, was formerly in Pattiswick church, but was removed, and after being used some time for other purposes was presented to Coggeshall church 1852: the chancel was repaired in 1851, and the church been fully restored: there are 1,000 sittings. The register dates from October, 1584, and is in fair condition. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £180, with residence and 22 acres of glebe, in the gift of C. H. Copley Du Cane esq. and held since 1892 by the Rev. Charles Craigie Mills MA of University College, Oxford. Sir Thomas C. C. Western bart. Walter Skingley esq Mrs Annie Skingley and Mrs Reginald Duke Hill are the lay impropiators.

The Congregational chapel, erected 1715, has been several times enlarged, the last enlargement being in 1865; at the back of the chapel here are spacious school rooms for 600 children, additional class rooms and a lecture hall were added in 1890. An Independent chapel is said to have been founded here by Dr John Owen, chaplain to the Protector, Oliver Cromwell; there is a manse in East street, purchased by congregation as a residence for the minister. There are also Baptist and Wesleyan chapels and a meeting house for the Society of Friends. A Cemetery of 3 acres, at the back of the church, was formed and laid out 1855-6, at a cost of £1,500, and contains a chapel for Dissenters: it is now controlled by the Parish Council. The market, which is scarcely more than nominal, was granted by Henry III. as also the right of holding a fair on

Whit-Tuesday. There is a Liberal club, and in Church street is a reading room, with a library attached.

The refining and manufacture of patent isinglass and gelatine and tambour lace making are carried on, and there are breweries and maltings, sewing factories &c.

The town is noted for velvet weaving, and two looms have been employed during the present year (1902): making velvet for coronation robes.

The Essex Bank (Barclay and Co. Limited) and the London and County Banking Co. Limited have branches here. A tower containing a clock and surmounted by a cupola, was erected in 1887. Holfield Grange, a mile and a half north-west, on the Roman road from Colchester to Dunmow, the property and residence of Mrs Reginald Duke Hill, is a modern Tudor mansion. There are six alms houses, founded in 1795, and five of recent construction; the charities for distribution among the general poor amount to £278 yearly, and there are other charities comprising four tenements in Church street and Stoneham street. C. H. Copley Du Cane esq of Braxted Park Witham, is lord of the manor, Mrs Reginaid Duke Hill, Sir Thomas Charles Callis Western bart, Walter Skingley esq and Mrs Annie Skingley are the chief landowner: The land is undulating; oil, light loam; subsoil, gravelly, with several small streams running through it The chief crops are

seeds, wheat, barley, turnips mangels, peas and beans.

Great Coggeshall has an area of 2,619 acres of land an 13 of water; rateable value, £6,973; the population in 1901 was 2,578.

LITTLE COGGESHALL, on the southern bank of the river Blackwater, is connected with Great Coggeshall b a bridge. King Stephen and Queen Maud, heiress of Eustace, Earl of Boulogne, who held these manors of the Conqueror, founded here a Cistercian abbey in 1142 dedicated to the Virgin Mary and colonized from Savigny which at the Dissolution was valued at £298 8s. a year the remains of this abbey, situated near the river, afford the earliest instance of medieval brickwork at present met with in this country; the most ancient portion being a massive fragment once forming part of an arcade; various carved stones, including a Transition Norman capital, lie scattered about and there are two thick walls also apparently belonging to the abbey buildings: the existing inequalities of the ground, extending some distance to the left, seem to indicate that the foundation covered a considerable area. Near these ruins, on the right bank of the little river Blackwater, is a picturesque old gabled house, with groups of clustered chimneys built in the reign of Henry VIII, partly on the site and with the materials of the abbey: the river flows in an artificial bed constructed by the monks in order to secure a head of water for their mill and is crossed by an old bridge, at the corner of which stands a dwelling known as the "Rood House," probably marking by this name the former site of a cross or rood at the entrance to the abbey demesnes. All the lands which belonged to it at the time of its dissolution continue to be free from tithes both great and small, whilst cultivated in the hands of the proprietors: the church of the monastery, which is entirely demolished, stood in the park in a field near the river. The existing church of Little Coggeshall, dedicated to St. Nicholas and standing near the site of the abbey is a simple rectangular building constructed of flint and rubble, with dressings of brick around the lancet-shaped windows: at the east end are sedilia and here and there are traces of decorative painting: it had been used as a barn, but was some years ago given up by the owner, the late Mr J. Bullock, to the vicar of the parish, and was restored in 1897 from designs of Mr G. F. Bodley A.R.A. architect, at a cost of £1,100; there are 150 sittings.

Little Coggeshall has 1,009 acres of fertile land in a high state of cultivation, and 11 of water; the soil is light, producing excellent crops of wheat, barley, turnips and green crops generally; rateable value, £1,617; the population in 1901 was 304 (the total population of Great and Little Coggeshall in 1901 being 2,822).



Kelly 1908

COGGESHALL is a town consisting of two parishes, Great Coggeshall in Lexden hundred and Little Coggeshall in Witham hundred, on opposite banks of the river Blackwater, connected by an ancient bridge of three arches, and distant from Kelvedon station on the Great Eastern railway 2 miles, from Witham 7 north-east, from Colchester 9 west, from Halstead 8 south and from Braintree 6 east and from London 44, in the Eastern division of the county, Witham petty sessional division, Braintree union and county court district, in the rural deanery of Coggeshall and Tey, archdeaconry of Colchester and diocese of St. Albans. The town, anciently a Roman station, stands partly on low ground bordering the river, whence it rises and occupies the acclivity of a hill, from which it may have derived its earlier name of "Sunnedon;" it is noted for its numerous springs of pure water, many houses being supplied therewith by iron pipes, and for centuries past the land has been famous for the growth of garden seeds: the town is lighted with gas, from works in East street, the property of a company. The church of St. Peter ad Vincula is a fine building of stone and flint, entirely in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel with aisles, clerestoried nave of five bays, aisles, south porch and an embattled western tower with angle turret, containing 8 bells, 6 of which are dated 1681, 1877, 1733, 1733, 1757, 1806; the two latest were cast in 1876: there are three sedilia and a piscina in the south chancel aisle, where also are two memorial windows, erected in 1888, to Joseph Smith Surridge, and there are others, including one to Major George Deeks Skingley, who presented the stained west window, and the east window given by the Hanbury family, of Holfield Grange: there is also a finely carved oak screen and a richly decorated reeredos of Caen stone and alabaster placed in 1880 as a memorial to the late Rev. W. J. Dampier, for 33 years vicar of this parish; it consists of groups of figures representing scriptural events, beneath carved canopies and between these are small niches with figures of archangels: the carved oak pulpit was executed in 1871 by Mr W. B. Polley: the font, which is Early English, was formerly in Pattiswick church, but was removed, and after being used some time for other purposes was presented to Coggeshall church in 1852: the chancel was repaired in 1851, and the church has been fully restored: there are 1,000 sittings. The register dates from October, 1584, and is in fair condition. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £180, with residence and 22 acres of glebe, in the gift of C. H. Copley Du Cane esq. and held since 1903 by the Rev. Francis Shirley Stoney M.A. of St. John's College, Oxford. Sir Thomas C. C. Western bart Walter Skingley esq. Mrs Annie Skingley and Mrs Reginald Duke Hill are the lay impropriators. The Congregational chapel, erected in 1715, has been several times enlarged, the last enlargement being in 1865 at the back of the chapel there are spacious school rooms for 600 children, and class rooms and a lecture hall were added in 1890. An Independent chapel is said to have been founded here by Dr John Owen, chaplain to the Protector, Oliver Cromwell. There is a Baptist chapel, erected in 1829, with 400 sittings, and a Wesleyan Methodist chapel and a meeting house for the Society of Friends. A Cemetery of 3 acres, at the back of the church, was formed and laid out in 1855-6, at a cost of £1,500, and contains a chapel for Dissenters: it is now controlled by the Parish Council. The market, which is scarcely more than nominal, was granted by Henry III. as also the right of holding a fair on Whit-Tuesday. There is a Liberal club, and in Church street is a reading room with a library attached.

The refining and manufacture of patent isinglass and gelatine is carried on, and there are breweries and maltings, sewing factories &c. The town has been noted for velvet weaving, and one loom is still worked. The manufacture of Tambour lace was begun here in the early part of the 19th century by a French refugee, named Draygo, who, with his daughters, settled here and taught the art, and the making of this delicate form of lace is now a local industry. Owing to the exquisite variety of stitches introduced, the lace produced by the tambour hook has a soft and most varied appearance, and the demand for it is constantly increasing; The Misses Spurge, of Church street, superintend the work in Coggeshall, and Miss M. Lambert, of 52 Abingdon court, Kensington W, in London. The Essex Bank (Barclay and Co. Limited) and the London and County Banking Co. Limited have branches here. A tower, containing a clock and surmounted by a cupola, was erected in 1887. Holfield Grange, a modern mansion, a mile and a half northwest, on the Roman road from Colchester to Dunmow, is the property and residence of Reginald Duke Hill esq. J.P. There are six almshouses, founded in 1795, and five of recent construction: the charities for distribution among the general poor amount to £278 yearly, and there are other charities, comprising four tenements in Church street and Stoneham street. C. H. Copley Du Cane esq. of Braxted Park, Witham, is lord of the manor, Mrs Reginald Duke Hill, Sir Thomas Charles Callis Western bart. Walter Skingley esq and Mrs Annie Skingley are the chief landowners. land is undulating; soil, light loam; subsoil, gravelly, with several small streams running through it. The chief

crops are seeds, wheat, barley, turnips, mangels, peas and beans. Great Coggeshall has an area of 2,621 acres of land and 11 of water; assessable value, £6,341; the population in 1901 was 2,578. The population of the ecclesiastical parish of St. Peter ad Vincula with Little Coggeshall was 2,882.

LITTLE COGGESHALL, on the southern bank of the river Blackwater, is connected with Great Coggeshall by a bridge. King Stephen and Queen Maud, heiress of Eustace, Earl of Boulogne, who held these manors of the Conqueror, founded here a Cistercian abbey in 1142, dedicated to the Virgin Mary and colonized from Savigny, which at the Dissolution was valued at £298 8s. a year: the remains of this abbey, situated near the river, afford the earliest instance of medieval brickwork at present met with in this country; the most ancient portion being a massive fragment once forming part of an arcade: various carved stones, including a Transition Norman capital, lie scattered about and there are two thick walls, also apparently belonging to the abbey buildings: the existing inequalities of the ground, extending some distance to the left, seem to indicate that the foundations covered a considerable area. Near these ruins, on the right bank of the little river Blackwater, is a picturesque old gabled house, with groups of clustered chimneys, built in the reign of Henry VIII. partly on the site and with the materials of the abbey: the river flows in an artificial bed constructed by the monks in order to secure a head of water for their mill and is crossed by an old bridge, at the corner of which stands a dwelling known as the "Rood House," probably marking by this name the former site of a cross or rood at the entrance to the abbey demesnes. All the lands which belonged to it at the time of its dissolution continue to be free from tithes, both great and small, whilst cultivated in the hands of the proprietors: the church of the monastery, which is entirely demolished, stood in the park in a field near the river. The existing church of Little Coggeshall, dedicated to St. Nicholas and standing near the site of the abbey, is a simple rectangular building constructed of flint and rubble, with dressings of brick around the lancet-shaped windows: at the east end are sedilia and here and there are traces of decorative painting: it had been used as a barn, but was some years ago given up by the owner, the late Mr J. Bullock, to the vicar of the parish, and was restored in 1897 from designs of Mr G. F. Bodley A.R.A. architect, at a cost of £1,100; there are 150 sittings.

Little Coggeshall has 1,009 acres of fertile land in a high state of cultivation, and 11 of water; the soil is light, producing excellent crops of wheat, barley, turnips and green crops generally; assessable value, £1,339; the population in 1901 was 304.

Kelly 1922

COGGESHALL is a town consisting of two parishes, Great Coggeshall in Lexden hundred and Little Coggeshall in Witham hundred, on opposite banks of the river Blackwater, connected by an ancient bridge of three arches, and distant from Kelvedon station on the Great Eastern railway 2 miles, from Witham 7 north-east, from Colchester 9 west, from Halstead 8 south and from Braintree 6 east and from London 44, in the Maldon division of the county, Witham petty sessional division, Braintree union, Dunmow and Braintree joint county court district, Coggeshall and Tey rural deanery, archdeaconry of Colchester and Chelmsford diocese. The town, anciently a Roman station, stands partly on low ground bordering the river, whence it rises and occupies the acclivity of a hill, from which it may have derived its earlier name of "Sunnedon."

The town and the adjoining parishes of Little Coggeshall, Feering and Kelvedon are supplied with water from an artesian well in St Peter's road, from which the water is pumped into a reservoir on the road to Colne; the work was carried out under the direction of the Braintree Rural District Council in 1911 at a cost of £8,000: the town is lighted with gas, supplied from Kelvedon.

The church of St. Peter ad Vincula is a fine building of stone and flint, entirely in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel with aisles, clerestoried nave of five bays, aisles, south porch and an embattled western tower with angle turret containing 8 bells, 6 of which are dated 1681, 1733, 1733, 1757, 1787, 1806; the two latest were cast in 1876: there are three sedilia and a piscina in the south chancel aisle, where also are two memorial windows, erected in 1888, to Joseph Smith Surrudge, and there are others, including one to Major George Deeks Skingley, who presented the stained west window, and the east window given by the Hanbury family, of Holfield Grange: there is also a finely carved oak screen and a richly decorated reredos of Caen stone and alabaster placed in 1880 as a memorial to the late Rev W. J. Dampier, for 33 years vicar of this parish; it consists of groups of figures representing scriptural events, beneath carved canopies, and between these are small niches with figures of archangels: the carved oak pulpit was executed in 1871 by Mr W. B. Polley: the font, which is Early English, was formerly in Pattiswick church, but was removed, and after being used some time for other purposes was presented to Coggeshall church in 1852: the chancel was repaired in 1851, and the church has been fully restored: there are 1,000 sittings. The register dates from October, 1584, and is in fair condition. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £465, with residence and 22 acres of glebe, in the gift of C. H. Copley Du Cane esq. and held since 1903 by the Rev Francis Shirley Stoney M.A. of St. John's College, Oxford. The trustees of the late Sir Thomas C. C. Western bart. Walter Skingley esq. Mrs Annie Skingley and Mrs Reginald Duke Hill are the lay impropiators.

The Congregational chapel, erected in 1715, has been several times enlarged, the last enlargement being in 1865 at the back of the chapel there are spacious school rooms for 600 children, and class rooms and a lecture hall were added in 1890. An Independent chapel is said to have been founded here by Dr John Owen, chaplain to the Protector, Oliver Cromwell. There is a Baptist chapel, erected in 1829, with 400 sittings, and a Wesleyan Methodist chapel and a meeting house for the Society of Friends.

A Cemetery of 3 acres, at the back of the church, was formed and laid out in 1855-6, at a cost of £1,500, and was enlarged in 1911 by the addition of two acres, at a cost of £800; the cemetery contains a chapel for Dissenters, and is now controlled by the Parish Council.

To perpetuate the memory of 78 men of Great and Little Coggeshall who gave their lives in the Great War, a handsome monument was erected and unveiled in 1920: it stands on a piece of land formerly known as "Starling Leeze," and consists of three solid blocks of Cornish granite, with column surmounted by a bronze figure of Victory holding the trumpet of victory in one hand and the laurel crown of peace in the other: adjoining there is a recreation ground, which is also part of the war memorial; this consists of about five acres of pasture land, and is open to the public for ever.

The market, which is scarcely more than nominal, was granted by Henry III. as also the right of holding a fair on Whit-Tuesday. There is a Liberal club in Queen street, and in Church street is a Constitutional club.

The refining and manufacture of patent isinglass and gelatine is carried on, and there are breweries and maltings, sewing factories &c. The town has been noted for velvet weaving, and one loom is still worked.

The manufacture of tambour lace was begun here in the early part of the 19th century by a French refugee, named Draygo, who, with his daughters, settled here and taught the art, and the making of this delicate form of lace is now a local industry. Owing to the exquisite variety of stitches introduced, the lace produced by the tambour hook has a soft and most varied appearance, and the demand for it is constantly increasing: The Misses Spurge, of Church street, superintend the work in Coggeshall. The Coggeshall Tambour Lace Workers are also assisted

by Mrs Reginald Hill and Miss E. M. Surrudge to obtain sales of the lace worked by the cottagers in their own homes.

The Essex Bank (Barclays Bank Limited) and the London County Westminster and Parr's Bank Limited have branches here. A tower, containing a clock and surmounted by a cupola, was erected in 1887. Holfield Grange, a modern mansion, a mile and a half northwest on the Roman road from Colchester to Dunmow, is the property and residence of Mrs Reginald Duke

There are six almshouses, founded in 1795, Hill. and five of recent construction; the charities for distribution among the general poor amount to £278 yearly, and there are other charities, comprising four tenements in Church street and Stoneham street.

C. H. Copley Du Cane esq. is lord of the manor, Mrs Reginald Duke Hill, the trustees of the late Sir Thomas Charles Callis Western bart. Walter Skingley esq. and Mrs Annie Skingley are the chief landowners. The land is undulating; soil, light loam; subsoil, gravelly, with several small streams running through it. The chief crops are seeds, wheat, barley, turnips, mangolds, peas and beans.

Great Coggeshall has an area of 2,621 acres of land and 11 of water; rateable value, £5,951; the population in 1911 was 2,365.

The population of the ecclesiastical parish of St. Peter ad Vincula with Little Coggeshall was 2,694.

LITTLE COGGESHALL, on the southern bank of the river Blackwater, is connected with Great Coggeshall by a bridge. King Stephen and Queen Maud, heiress of Eustace, Earl of Boulogne, who held these manors of the Conqueror, founded here a Cistercian abbey in 1142, dedicated to the Virgin Mary and colonized from Savigny, which at the Dissolution was valued at £298 8s. a year: the remains of this abbey, situated near the river, afford the earliest instance of medieval brickwork at present met with in this country; the most ancient portion being a massive fragment once forming part of an arcade: various carved stones, including a Transition Norman capital, lie scattered about and there are two thick walls, also apparently belonging to the abbey buildings: the existing inequalities of the ground, extending some distance to the left, seem to indicate that the foundations covered a considerable area. Near these ruins, on the right bank of the little river Blackwater, is a picturesque old gabled house, with groups of clustered chimneys, built in the reign of Henry VIII. partly on the site and with the materials of the abbey: the river flows in an artificial bed constructed by the monks in order to secure a head of water for their mill, and is crossed by an old bridge, at the corner of which stands a dwelling known as the "Rood House," probably marking by this name, the former site of a cross or rood at the entrance to the abbey demesnes. All the lands which belonged to it at the time of its dissolution continue to be free from tithes, both great and small, whilst cultivated in the hands of the proprietors: the church of the monastery, which is entirely demolished, stood in the park in a field near the river.

The existing church of Little Coggeshall, dedicated to St. Nicholas and standing near the site of the abbey, is a simple rectangular building constructed of flint and rubble, with dressings of brick around the lancet-shaped windows: at the east end are sedilia and here and there are traces of decorative painting: it had been used as a barn, but was some years ago given up by the owner, the late Mr J. Bullock, to the vicar of the parish, and was restored in 1897 from designs of Mr G. F. Bodley A.R.A. architect, at a cost of £1,100; there are 50 sittings.

Little Coggeshall has 1,009 acres of fertile land in a high state of cultivation, and 11 of water; the soil is light, producing excellent crops of wheat, barley, turnips, peas and green crops generally; rateable value, £1,022; the population in 1911 was 329.

Kelly 1929

COGGESHALL is a town consisting of two parishes, Great Coggeshall in Lexden hundred and Little Coggeshall in Witham hundred, on opposite banks of the river Blackwater, connected by an ancient bridge of three arches, and distant from Kelvedon station on the London and North Eastern railway 2 miles, from Witham 7 north-east, from Colchester 9 west, from Halstead 8 south and from Braintree 6 east and from London 44, in the Maldon division of the county, Witham petty sessional division, Braintree union, Dunmow and Braintree joint county court district, Coggeshall and Tey rural deanery, archdeaconry of Colchester and Chelmsford diocese. The town, anciently a Roman station, stands partly on low ground bordering the river, whence it rises and occupies the acclivity of a hill, from which it may have derived its earlier name of "Sunnedon."

The town and the adjoining parishes of Little Coggeshall, Feering and Kelvedon are supplied with water from an artesian well in St. Peter's road, from which the water is pumped into a reservoir on the road to Colne; the work was carried out under the direction of the Braintree Rural District Council in 1911 at a cost of £8,000: the town is lighted with gas, supplied from Kelvedon.

The church of St. Peter ad Vincula is a fine building of stone and flint, entirely in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel with aisles, clerestoried nave of five bays, aisles, south porch and an embattled western tower with angle turret containing 8 bells, 6 of which are dated 1681, 1733, 1733, 1757, 1787, 1806; the two latest were cast in 1876: there are three sedilia and a piscina in the south chancel aisle, where also are two memorial windows, erected in 1888, to Joseph Smith Surridge, and there are others, including one to Major George Decks Skingley, who presented the stained west window, and the east window given by the Hanbury family, of Holfield Grange: there is also a finely carved oak screen and a richly decorated reredos of Caen stone and alabaster placed in 1880 as a memorial to the late Rev W. J. Dampier, for 33 years vicar of this parish; it consists of groups of figures representing scriptural events, beneath carved canopies, and between these are small niches with figures of archangels: the carved oak pulpit was executed in 1871 by Mr. W. B. Polley: the font, which is Early English, was formerly in Pattiswick church, but was removed, and after being used some time for other purposes was presented to Coggeshall church in 1852: the chancel was repaired in 1851, and the church has been fully restored: there are 1,000 sittings. The register dates from October, 1584, and is in fair condition. The living is a vicarage, united with the rectory of Markshall, joint net yearly value about £600, with residence and 22 acres of glebe, in the gift of C. H. Copley Du Cane esq. D.L., J.P. and held since 1924 by the Rev Hubert Valentine Eardley-Wilmot M.A. of Keble College, Oxford. The trustees of the late Sir Thomas C. C. Western bart. Walter Skingley esq. Mrs Annie Skingley and Mrs Reginald Duke Hill are the lay impropriators.

Congregational chapel, erected in 1715, has been several times enlarged, the last enlargement being in 1865 at the back of the chapel there are spacious school rooms for 600 children, and classrooms and a lecture hall were added in 1890. An Independent chapel is said to have been founded here by Dr. John Owen, chaplain to the Protector, Oliver Cromwell. There is a Baptist chapel, erected in 1829. with 400 sittings, and a Wesleyan Methodist chapel and a meeting house for the Society of Friends. A Cemetery of 3 acres, at the back of the church, was formed and laid out in 1855-6, at a cost of £1,500, and was enlarged in 1911 by the addition of two acres, at a cost of £800; the cemetery contains a chapel for Dissenters, and is now controlled by the Parish Council.

To perpetuate the memory of 78 men of Great and Little Coggeshall who gave their lives in the Great War, a handsome monument was erected and unveiled in 1920: it stands on a piece of land formerly known as Starling Leeze," and consists of three solid blocks of Cornish granite, with column surmounted by a bronze figure of Victory holding the trumpet of victory in one hand and the laurel crown of peace in the other: adjoining there is a recreation ground, which is also part of the war memorial; this consists of about five acres of pasture land, and is open to the public for ever.

There is a Liberal club in Queen street, and in Church street is a Constitutional club. The refining and manufacture of patent isinglass and gelatine is carried on, and there are maltings, a brewery, sewing factories &c. The manufacture of tambour lace was begun here in the early part of the 19th century by a French refugee, named Draygo, who, with his daughters, settled here and taught the art, and the making of this delicate form of lace is now a local industry. Owing to the exquisite variety of stitches introduced, the lace produced by the tambour hook has a soft and most varied appearance, and the demand for it is constantly increasing; The Misses Spurge, of Church street, superintend the work in Coggeshall. The Coggeshall Tambour Lace Workers are also assisted by Mrs Reginald Hill and Miss E. M. Surridge to obtain sales of the lace worked by the cottagers in their own homes.

Holfield Grange, a modern mansion, a mile and a half north-west on the Roman road from Colchester to Dunmow, is the property and residence of Mrs Reginald Duke Hill.

There are eleven almshouses, five of which were founded in 1795; the charities for distribution among the general poor amount to £278 yearly, and there are other charities, comprising four tenements in Church street and Stoneham street.

Mrs R. D. Hill and Messrs. James Parish and Sons Ltd. are the chief landowners. The land is undulating; soil, light loam; subsoil, gravelly, with several small streams running through it. The chief crops are seeds, wheat, barley, turnips, mangolds, peas and beans.

Great Coggeshall has an area of 2,621 acres of land and 11 of water; the population in 1921 was 2,300.

The population of the ecclesiastical parish of St. Peter ad Vincula with Little Coggeshall was 2,640.

LITTLE COGGESHALL, on the southern bank of the river Blackwater, is connected with Great Coggeshall by a bridge. King Stephen and Queen Maud, heiress of Eustace, Earl of Boulogne, who held these manors of the Conqueror, founded here a Cistercian abbey in 1142, dedicated to the Virgin Mary and colonized from Savigny, which at the Dissolution was valued at £298 8s. a year: the remains of this abbey, situated near the river, afford the earliest instance of medieval brickwork at present met with in this country; the most ancient portion being a massive fragment once forming part of an arcade: various carved stones, including a Transition Norman capital, lie scattered about and there are two thick walls. also apparently belonging to the abbey buildings: the existing inequalities of the ground, extending some distance to the left, seem to indicate that the foundations covered a considerable area. Near these ruins, on the right bank of the little river Blackwater, is a picturesque old gabled house, with groups of clustered chimneys, built in the reign of Henry VIII. partly on the site and with the materials of the abbey: the river flows in an artificial bed constructed by the monks in order to secure a head of water for their mill, and is crossed by an old bridge, at the corner of which stands a dwelling known as the "Rood House," probably marking by this name the former site of a cross or rood at the entrance to the abbey demesnes. All the lands which belonged to it at the time of its dissolution continue to be free from tithes, both great and small, whilst cultivated in the hands of the proprietors: the church of the monastery, which is entirely demolished, stood in the park in a field near the river.

The existing church of Little Coggeshall, dedicated to St. Nicholas and standing near the site of the abbey, is a simple rectangular building constructed of flint and rubble, with dressings of brick around the lancet-shaped windows: at the east end are sedilia and here and there are traces of decorative painting: it had been used as a barn, but was some years ago given up by the owner, the late Mr. J. Bullock, to the vicar of the parish, and was restored in 1897 from designs of Mr. G. F. Bodley A.R.A. architect, at a cost of 1.100; there are 50 sittings.

Little Coggeshall has 1,009 acres of fertile land in high state of cultivation, and 11 of water; the soil is light, producing excellent crops of wheat, barley, turnips, peas and green crops generally; the population in 1921 was 338.

COGGESHALL is a town consisting of two parishes, Great Coggeshall in
 Lexden hundred and Little Cogges hall in Witham hundred, on opposite
 banks of the river Blackwater, connected by an ancient bridge of three
 arches, and distant from Kelvedon station on the London and North
 Eastern railway 2 miles, from Witham 7 north-east, from Colchester 91/2
 west, from Halstead 8 south and from Braintree 6 east and from London
 44, in the Maldon division of the courts Witham petty sessional division,
 Braintree rural district, Dunmow and Braintree joint county court district
 Coggeshall and Tey rural deanery, archdeaconry of Colchester and
 Chelmsford diocese.

The town, anciently a Roman station, stands partly on low ground
 bordering the river, whence it rises and occupies the acclivity of a hill, from
 which it may have derived its earlier name The town and the adjoining
 parishes Little Coggeshall, Feering and Kelvedon are supplied with water
 from an artesian well in St. Peter's road, from which the water is pumped
 into a reservoir on the road to Colne; the work was carried out under
 the direction of the Braintree Rural District Council in 1911 at a cost of
 £8,000: the town is lighted with electric light supplied by the East Anglian
 Electric.

The church of St. Peter-ad-Vincula is a fine building of stone and flint,
 entirely in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel with aisles,
 clerestoried nave of five bays, aisles, south porch and embattled western
 tower with angle turret containing 8 bells, 6 of which are dated 1681,
 1733, 1733, 1757, 1787, 1806; the two latest were cast in 1876: there
 are three sedilia and a piscina in the south chancel aisle, where also are
 two memorial windows, erected in 1888, to Joseph Smith Surridge, and
 there are others, including one to Major George Deeks Skingley, who
 presented the stained west window, and the east window given by the
 Hanbury family, of Holfield Grange: there is also a finely carved oak screen
 and a richly decorated reredos of Caen stone and alabaster placed in
 1880 as a memorial to the late Rev. W. J. Dampier, for 33 years vicar of
 this parish; it consists of groups of figures representing scriptural events,
 beneath carved canopies, and between these are small niches with figures
 of archangels: the carved oak pulpit was executed in 1871 by Mr. W. B.
 Polley: the font, which is Early English, was formerly in Pattiswick church,
 but was removed, and after being used some time for other purposes
 was presented to Coggeshall church in 1852: the chancel was repaired
 in 1851, and the church has been fully restored: there are 1,000 sittings.
 The register dates from October, 1584, and is in fair condition. The living
 is a vicarage, united with the rectory of Markshall, joint net yearly value
 about £600, with residence and 22 acres of glebe. the gift of C. H. Copley
 Du Cane esq. D.L., J.P. who has two turns, and the Society for the
 Maintenance the Faith, who have one turn, and held since 1930 by the
 Rev. Frank Pickford M.A. of Emmanuel College, Cambridge. The trustees
 of the late Sir Thomas C. C. Western bart. Walter Skingley esq. Mrs
 Annie Skingley and Mrs Reginald Duke Hill are the lay impropriators. The
 Congregational chapel, erected in 1715, has been several times enlarged,
 the last enlargement being in 1865: at the back of the chapel there are
 spacious school rooms for 600 children, and classrooms and a lecture hall
 were added in 1890. An Independent chapel is said to have been founded
 here by Dr. John Owen, chaplain to the Protector, Oliver Cromwell.
 There is a Baptist chapel, erected in 1829, with 400 sittings, and a
 Methodist chapel and meeting house for the Society of Friends. A
 Cemetery 3 acres, at the back of the church, was formed and laid out in
 1855-6, at a cost of £1,500, and was enlarged in 1911 by the addition of
 two acres, at a cost 800; the cemetery contains a chapel for Dissenters,
 and is now controlled by the Parish Council.

To perpetuate the memory of 78 men of Great and Little Coggeshall who
 gave their lives in the Great War, a handsome monument was erected and
 unveiled in 1920: it stands on a piece of land formerly known as Starling
 Leeze," and consists of three solid blocks of Cornish granite, with column
 surmounted by a bronze figure of Victory holding the trumpet of victory
 in hand and the laurel crown of peace in the other: adjoining there is a
 recreation ground, which is also part of the war memorial; this consists
 of about five acres of pasture land, and is open to the public for ever.
 There is a Brotherhood club in Queen street, and in Church street is a
 Constitutional club.

The refining and manufacture of patent isinglass and gelatine is carried on,
 and there are maltings, a brewery, sewing factories &c. The manufacture
 of tambour lace was begun here in the early part of the 19th century by a
 French refugee, named Draygo, who, with his daughters, settled here and
 taught the art, and the making of this delicate form of lace is now a local
 industry. Owing to the exquisite variety of stitches introduced, the lace
 produced by the tambour hook has a soft and most varied appearance,
 and the demand for it is constantly increasing; The Misses Spurge, of
 Church street, superintend the work in Coggeshall. The Coggeshall
 Tambour Lace Workers are also assisted by Mrs Reginald Hill and Miss

E. M. Surrige to obtain sales of the lace worked by the cottagers in their own homes.

Holfield Grange, a modern mansion, a mile and a half north-west on the Roman road from Colchester to Dunmow, is the property and residence of Mrs Reginald Duke Hill.

There are eleven almshouses, five of which were founded in 1795; the charities for distribution among the general poor amount to £348 yearly, and there are other charities, comprising four tenements in Church street and Stoneham street.

Mrs R. D. Hill and Messrs. James Parish and Sons Ltd. are the chief landowners. The land is undulating; soil, light loam; subsoil, gravelly, with several small streams running through it. The chief crops are seeds, wheat, barley, turnips, mangolds, peas and beans.

Great Coggeshall has an area of 2,621 acres of land and 11 of water; the population in 1931 was 2,259.

The population of the ecclesiastical parish of St. Peter ad Vincula with Little Coggeshall in 1921 was 2,640.

LITTLE COGGESHALL, on the southern bank of the river Blackwater, is connected with Great Coggeshall by a bridge. King Stephen and Queen Maud, heiress of Eustace, Earl of Boulogne, who held these manors of the Conqueror, founded here a Cistercian abbey in 1142, dedicated to the Virgin Mary and colonized from Savigny, which at the Dissolution was valued at £298 8s. a year: the remains of this abbey, situated near the river, afford the earliest instance of medieval brickwork at present met with in this country; the most ancient portion being a massive fragment once forming part of an arcade: various carved stones, including a Transition Norman capital, lie scattered about and there are two thick walls. also apparently belonging to the abbey buildings: the existing inequalities of the ground, extending some distance to the left, seem to indicate that the foundations covered a considerable area. Near these ruins, on the right bank of the little river Blackwater, is a picturesque old gabled house, with groups of clustered chimneys, built in the reign of Henry VIII. partly on the site and with the materials of the abbey: the river flows in an artificial bed constructed by the monks in order to secure a head of water for their mill, and is crossed by an old bridge, at the corner of which stands a dwelling known as the "Rood House," probably marking by this name the former site of a cross or rood at the entrance to the abbey demesnes. All the lands which belonged to it at the time of its dissolution continue to be free from tithes, both great and small, whilst cultivated in the hands of the proprietors: the church of the monastery, which is entirely demolished, stood in the park in a field near the river. The existing church of Little Coggeshall, dedicated to St. Nicholas and standing near the site of the abbey, is a simple rectangular building constructed of flint and rubble, with dressings of brick around the lancet-shaped windows: at the east end are sedilia and here and there are traces of decorative painting: it had been used as a barn, but was some years ago given up by the owner, the late Mr. J. Bullock, to the vicar of the parish, and was restored in 1897 from designs of Mr. G. F. Bodley A.R.A. architect, at a cost of £1,100; there are 50 sittings.

Little Coggeshall has 1,009 acres of fertile land in a high state of cultivation, and 11 of water; the soil is light, producing excellent crops of wheat, barley, turnips, peas and green crops generally; the population in 1931 was 380.

Kelly 1937

COGGESHALL is a town consisting of two parishes, Great Coggeshall in Lexden hundred and Little Cogges hall in Witham hundred, on opposite banks of the river Blackwater, connected by an ancient bridge of three arches, and distant from Kelvedon station on the London and North Eastern railway 2 miles, from Witham 7 north-east, from Colchester 9 west, from Halstead 8 south and from Braintree 6 east and from London 44, in the Maldon division of the county, Witham petty sessional division, Braintree rural district, and county court district, Coggeshall and Tey rural deanery, archdeaconry of Colchester and Chelmsford diocese.

The town, anciently a Roman station, stands partly on low ground bordering the river, whence it rises and occupies the acclivity of a hill, from which it may have derived its earlier name of "Sunnedon." The town and the adjoining parishes of Little Coggeshall, Feering and Kelvedon are supplied with water from an artesian well in St. Peter's road, from which the water is pumped into a reservoir on the road to Colne; the work was carried out under the direction of the Braintree Rural District Council in 1911 at a cost of £8,000: the town is lighted with electric light supplied by the East Anglian Electric Supply Co. Ltd.

The church of St. Peter-ad-Vincula is a fine building of stone and flint, entirely in the Perpendicular style, consisting of chancel with aisles, clerestoried nave of five bays, aisles, south porch and an embattled western tower with angle turret containing 8 bells, 6 of which are dated 1681, 1733, 1733, 1757, 1787, 1806; the two latest were cast in 1876: there are three sedilia and a piscina in the south chancel aisle, where also are two memorial windows, erected in 1888, to Joseph Smith Surridge, and there are others, including one to Major George Deeks Skingley, who presented the stained west window, and the east window given by the Hanbury family, of Holfield Grange: there is also a finely carved oak screen and a richly decorated reredos of Caen stone and alabaster placed in 1880 as a memorial to the late Rev. W. J. Dampier, for 33 years vicar of this parish: the carved oak pulpit was executed in 1871: the font, which is Early English, was formerly in Pattiswick church, but was removed, and after being used some time for other purposes was presented to Coggeshall church in 1852: the chancel was repaired in 1851, and the church has been fully restored: there are 1,000 sittings. register dates from October, 1584, and is in fair condition.

The living is a vicarage, united with the rectory of Markshall, joint net yearly value about £600, with residence and 22 acres of glebe, in the gift of C. H. Copley Du Cane esq. D.L., J.P. who has two turns, and the Society for the Maintenance of the Faith, who have one turn, and held since 1937 by the Rev. Frederick Norman Brown M.A. of Lincoln College, Oxford. The trustees of the late Sir Thomas C. C. Western bart. Walter Skingley esq. and Mrs Annie Skingley are the lay impropiators.

The Congregational chapel, erected in 1715, has been several times enlarged, the last enlargement being in 1865: at the back of the chapel there are school rooms for 600 children, and classrooms and a lecture hall were added in 1890. An independent chapel is said to have been founded here by Dr. John Owen, chaplain to the Protector, Oliver Cromwell. There is a Baptist chapel, erected in 1829, with 400 sittings, and a Methodist chapel and meeting house for the Society of Friends.

A Cemetery of 3 acres, at the back of the church, was formed and laid out in 1885-6, and was enlarged in 1911 by the addition of two acres; the cemetery contains a chapel for Dissenters, and is now controlled by the Parish Council.

To perpetuate the memory of 78 men of Great and Little Coggeshall who fell in the Great War, 1914-18, a monument was erected in 1920: it stands on a piece of land formerly known as "Starling Leeze," and consists of three solid blocks of Cornish granite, with a column surmounted by a bronze figure of Victory holding the trumpet of victory in one hand and the laurel crown of peace in the other: adjoining there is a recreation ground, which is also part of the war memorial; this consists of about five acres of land, and is open to the public for ever.

Paycocks House, opposite the vicarage, West street, is a 15th-16th century building and possesses carved oak gateway and other features of interest It is the property of the National Trust, and is open to the public on specified days. The Woolpack Hotel is another very old building of architectural interest: dating from 1450 it was originally a priests' house and was later converted into an inn. In Church street is a Constitutional club.

The manufacture of tambour lace was begun here in the early part of the 19th century by a French refugee, named Draygo, who, with his daughters, settled here and taught the art, and the making of this delicate form of lace is now a local industry. Owing to the exquisite variety of stitches introduced, the lace produced by the tambour hook has a soft and most varied appearance.

Holfield Grange, a modern mansion, a mile and a half northwest on the Roman road from Colchester to Braintree, is the property and residence of

Capt. Francis Tower Hill.

There are eleven almshouses, five of which were founded in 1795; the charities for distribution among the general poor amount to £348 yearly, and there are other charities, comprising four tenements in Church street and Stoneham street.

Capt. F. T. Hill and Messrs. James Parish and Sons Ltd. are the chief landowners. The land is undulating; soil, light loam; subsoil, gravelly, with several small streams running through it. The chief crops are seeds, wheat, barley, turnips, mangolds, peas and beans.

Great Coggeshall has an area of 2,633 acres of land and inland water; the population in 1931 was 2,259. The population of the ecclesiastical parish of St. Peter ad Vincula with Little Coggeshall in 1931 was 2,691.

LITTLE COGGESHALL, on the southern bank of the river Blackwater, is connected with Great Coggeshall by a bridge. King Stephen and Queen Maud, heiress of Eustace, Earl of Boulogne, who held these manors of the Conqueror, founded here a Cistercian abbey in 1142, dedicated to the Virgin Mary and colonized from Savigny, which at the Dissolution was valued at £298 8s. a year: the remains of this abbey, situated near the river, afford the earliest instance of medieval brickwork at present met with in this country; the most ancient portion being a massive fragment once forming part of an arcade: various carved stones, including a Transition Norman capital, lie scattered about and there are two thick walls. also apparently belonging to the abbey buildings: the existing inequalities of the ground, extending some distance to the left, seem to indicate that the foundations covered a considerable area. Near these ruins, on the right bank of the little river Blackwater, is a picturesque old gabled house, with groups of clustered chimneys, built in the reign of Henry VIII. partly on the site and with the materials of the abbey: the river flows in an artificial bed constructed by the monks in order to secure a head of water for their mill, and is crossed by an old bridge, at the corner of which stands a dwelling known as the "Rood House," probably marking by this name the former site of a cross or rood at the entrance to the abbey demesnes. All the lands which belonged to it at the time of its dissolution continue to be free from tithes, both great and small, whilst cultivated in the hands of the proprietors: the church of the monastery, which is entirely demolished, stood in the park in a field near the river. The existing church of Little Coggeshall, dedicated to St. Nicholas and standing near the site of the abbey, is a simple rectangular building constructed of flint and rubble, with dressings of brick around the lancet-shaped windows: at the east end are sedilia and here and there are traces of decorative painting: it had been used as a barn, but was given up by the owner, the late Mr. J. Bullock, to the vicar of the parish, and was restored in 1897: there are 50 sittings. There are eight almshouses, built in 1934 under the provisions of the will of the late E. W. King esq.

Little Coggeshall has 1,009 acres of fertile land in a high state of cultivation, and 11 of water; the soil is light, producing excellent crops of wheat, barley, turnips, peas and green crops generally; the population in 1931 was 380.
